THE NEGRO TROOP FLEET TO BE AT MAGDALENA TODAY. Senate Committee's Report on Brownsville Affair Justifies Action of President

WASHINGTON, March 11.—In connection with the report on the Brownsville riot which the senate committee on military affairs rendered today, President Roosevelt transmitted a message in which he said that the facts set forth in his order dismissing the negro soldiers had been substantiated by the testimony before the committee. He recommended in his message that the time for reinstatement of the discharged soldiers, which has expired, be extended for a year in order to permit the president to reinstate any of the discharged men who do not fall within the terms of his dismissal. Senator Foraker presented the report of the committee on behalf of the majority and Senator Foraker the views of the minority.

The following is part of the text of the president's message: "The senate committee entrusted with the investigation of the Brownsville riot has now completed its work and finds that the facts upon which the president's order of November 5, 1905, was based are substantially confirmed by the evidence. The testimony secured by the committee is therefore now available. The time limit during which it was possible to reinstate any individual soldier has expired, and therefore recommend the passage of a law extending this time limit so far as the passage of the law and permitting the reinstatement by direction of the president of any man who in his judgment shall appear not to be worthy in the class whose discharge was deemed necessary in order to maintain the discipline and morale of the army."

The majority report contended that the shooting was done by some members of the Twenty-fifth infantry, though the testimony fails to identify the particular participants. The principal minority report, presented by Senator Foraker, contended that the negro soldiers be restored, as it has been impossible to ascertain who did the shooting.

Senator Foraker in a supplemental report, declaring that the testimony of witnesses against the negro soldiers is unreliable, and the weight of evidence shows that none of the negro soldiers participated.

A supplemental report by Senators Warren, Lodge, Warner and Du Pont declares the evidence shows the assault was perpetrated by members of the battalion, but that it is reasonable to believe that all the soldiers were not concerned.
