

### OAKLAND CHURCHES TO BE FEDERATED

Evangelical Clergymen Will Meet Tomorrow and Launch New Reform Movement

First Christian Congregation Prepares for a Series of Revival Meetings

OAKLAND, March 21.—All clergymen of the Evangelical churches have been invited to meet at the First Methodist Episcopal church at 8 o'clock Monday evening to form a federation. Each minister attending will take with him one layman for each 200 members of his congregation. The main object of the organization will be to have the churches work together for civic betterment and unite on all moral issues. Officers of the federation will be elected at the meeting. The official board and pastor of the First Christian church have completed arrangements whereby, commencing Easter Sunday, Sumner T. Martin will conduct revival services of two or three weeks' duration. In preparation for this Rev. Thomas A. Boyer will preach advance sermons as follows: "A New Catholicism, or belated prophecies of a reunited Christendom," March 22; "The New Awakening of the World, or the meaning of the current wave of reform," March 23; "The Gospel for the Times, or modern sin and the sermon on the mount," April 1; "A Repetition of the parable of the good samaritan in twentieth century settings," April 12. Plymouth Congregational church will hear a series of addresses by Prof. George D. Castor of the Pacific theological seminary on the last four Wednesdays of Lent, as follows: "The Great Temptation," March 25; "Among the Scribes and Pharisees," April 1; "In the Temple of Jerusalem," April 8; "The Garden and the Cross," April 15. Two weeks of revival services at the Tenth avenue Baptist church have proved a success, under the leadership of Rev. H. Wyse Jones and Prof. E. A. Spear, who will close Thursday night. Rev. William Spurgeon of London, Eng., will lecture on "The Welsh Revival" at the Tenth avenue church tomorrow afternoon. He is a cousin of the late Rev. Charles H. Spurgeon. Special soloists will sing at the United Presbyterian church Sunday. At the morning service Miss Leah Brackett will sing, and Misses Natalie Anton, Clara Morrow and H. B. W. Cady will sing in the evening. The annual church meeting will be held Wednesday evening at 7:45 o'clock. There will be a "kaffee klatch" at the church next Thursday, from 2 to 4 o'clock in the afternoon. A sacred concert will be given the first Sunday in April. "The New View of Crime—cures, not punishment," will be the topic of a lecture to be given by Christopher Russ, chief probation officer of Alameda county, at St. Paul's church tomorrow evening. ### DOODLE DEES MAKE A GREAT DISCOVERY

Hearst's Alameda Campaigners Find Six Voters Posing as Independents

Accidental Registration in Non-existing Party Is Triumph for Journalist

OAKLAND, March 21.—Inspection of the Hearst payroll having convinced his agents that material suitable for enrollment in the Independence league actually existed in Alameda county, consternation prevailed when the discovery was made that practically none of it had been registered for voting purposes under the new law. Results obtained from inspecting the lists of the registration clerk in the county clerk's office were compared with the known fact that six or seven voting people drew salaries from Hearst and, therefore, should throw in their votes with the doodle dees. Since January 1, by actual count, two voters have registered under the Hearst banner and the problem became acute when an attempt was made to find others. A comforting solution came today, when in addition to the regular inspector of the lists a special man was thrown into the canvass. He learned that six voters accidentally had registered as independents, despite the fact that there was no such party under the law. Thus it has been established that the payroll was strong enough to hold its beneficiaries to the task of promulgating the doctrine of Hearst as embodied in the records of his privately incorporated party. **WOMAN PICKS HIS POCKET** OAKLAND, March 21.—David C. Wallace of 1364 Fifth avenue reported to the police this morning that he was robbed by a woman pickpocket last night. He said the woman accosted him in Seventh street near a passage-way between Clay and Jefferson streets and asked him to step into the alley as she wished to speak with him. Wallace complied with her request. When he looked for his watch he found it was gone. ### SEEKS DEPORTATION TO EVADE JUSTICE

Chinese Girl Denounces Herself as Illegal Resident to Portland Police

Will Be Returned to Oakland to Face Charge of Stealing Merchant's \$400

OAKLAND, March 21.—Captain of Detectives Petersen, who is on his way to Portland to bring back Sue Sing, a Chinese girl charged with the theft of \$400 from Hong King, a Chinese merchant, is confronted with a peculiar situation in his fight for the custody of the girl. She left Oakland two weeks ago and went to the immigration authorities, to whom she pretended to be an alien, subject to deportation under the Chinese exclusion act. The girl wished to be sent to China that she might escape justice here, according to the police. By causing herself to be deported, she also would evade the payment of her fare across the Pacific. She did not dare to make herself subject to deportation in San Francisco, because she was born there and her photograph and description were in the possession of the immigration authorities. A contest is now on between the federal authorities and the Portland police, and the arrival in the north city of Captain Petersen probably will establish the legality of the police claims on the custody of the girl, as Petersen has taken with him the proofs of Miss Sue's birth in San Francisco. **BLIND PUPILS STAGE FARCE IN INSTITUTE** Musical Numbers Also Are on the Program of Entertainment **BERKELEY** March 21.—The annual farce and musical entertainment of the pupils of the California institute for the deaf, dumb and blind was held in the assembly hall tonight before a large audience. ### WOMAN'S SCREAMS BRING MEN TO AID

Choked by Greek, She Calls for Help and One of Thugs Is Captured

Angry Mob Pursues Two, Who Escape After Long Chase Through Streets

OAKLAND, March 21.—Three men, believed to have been Greeks, who waylaid and choked Mrs. Mary Harrington of 1614 Fifteenth street at the corner of Pacific and Willow streets, were pursued by a crowd of angry men, and one of the number, George Crose, was removed from his own home and arrested on a charge of disturbing the peace. The other two alleged assailants escaped after a chase. Mrs. Harrington had been to visit friends in West Oakland and was returning late in the night to her home, when she met three Greeks at the corner. One of the men seized her by the throat. She screamed. Policeman Tom Wood and several men rushed to her assistance. Crose was chased into his own house, and arrested, while the other two, one of whom did the choking, eluded the pursuers. Crose gave \$35 bail and his case was continued in the police court today. **WIFE SAYS JEALOUSY MADE HER MISERABLE** Lillian L. She alleges that he struck her and swore at her and made her miserable by his jealousy. She asked the custody of their child.
