PATROLMEN PUT ON TRIAL FOR GRAFT

Evidence Is Given in Cases of Behan and Sergeant Nolting

Owing to Missing Saloon Keeper, Prosecution Fails to Make Strong Case

Maurice Behan, the policeman, who is charged with having collected money from J. D. Samuelson, proprietor of the Kearny house at 712 Kearny street, the night of March 14, was put on trial last night at a meeting of the police commissioners.
