

REPORTS DEMANDS FOR FEDERAL LAWS

Conference of National Unions Advises Labor Council of Protest to Congress

Committee Secures Promise That School Department Will Use Union Made Goods

The San Francisco labor council, President J. W. Swann, presiding at its meeting last night received a report of the recent conference of national unions held in Washington, D. C. It shows that it was decided to prepare a memorial protesting against the inaction of congress in the matter of legislation in the interest of organized labor, and setting forth the demands of the representatives of labor.

The report calls attention to the recent decisions in injunction suits and suggests that the Sherman anti-trust law be amended so as to afford relief to labor organizations. It was referred to the committee on injunctions.

The secretary was instructed to investigate a charge that the Hahnemann hospital, which last year received \$900 from the city, employs Chinese and Japanese, and if he finds such to be true, report to the board of supervisors.

The printing pressmen's union No. 24 has elected the following officers for the ensuing term: D. Doggett, president; George Spooner, vice president; George W. Wittman, secretary; A. T. Roche, reading secretary; J. F. Lyons, treasurer; George Peterson, sergeant at arms.

D. J. Murray, financial secretary of butchers' union No. 115, having recovered from a severe attack of illness, was at his station last Wednesday night. The union is continuing its campaign in Chinatown as to butchers, who buy meat there. The committee will present its report at the next meeting.

The only business transacted at the session of the waitresses' union last Monday was the reception of seven petitions for membership and the initiation of five elected candidates. At the next meeting the members will be addressed on the subject of "Equal Pay for Equal Work."

PUBLIC WORKS BOARD URGES LARGER SALARIES... Commissioners Agree to Recommend Increase for City Engineer and Others... The public works commissioners met in executive session yesterday morning to consider estimates for the several departments under their control during the coming fiscal year.

CONVICTS FROM SHANGHAI... W. Hubert O'Brien, marshal of the United States court in China over which Judge Wiley presides, arrived yesterday on the liner Mongolia, en route to San Quentin with two prisoners, who were sentenced by Wiley to serve two years for circulating confederate money in Shanghai. The men would have served their time in the United States prison at Shanghai, but they walked out one day through a flimsy wall. They were recaptured by Chinese police before they got beyond the shadow of the wall. They were put in irons and at the first opportunity shipped to San Quentin. The men were convicted under the names of O. Bishop and J. C. Gould.
