The Albion Rovers and Thistles spent yesterday afternoon chasing one another around Freeman's park, Oakland, and the material result of the little soccer injected into the proceedings was a victory for the Rovers, 4 to 1. The Thistles were handicapped by the absence of several of their regular players.

Five minutes after the kickoff the Thistles' defense was called upon to clear, and on the ball being returned to midfield Pettie made connections and started on his goal.

The second half was more evenly contested and the Thistles at times showed some speed. After a hot rally Munroe—who, by the way, is a member of the Robert Burns team—found an opening and served the Rovers from a whitewash.
