Not longer ago than March 6 "Mrs. Warren's Profession" came to this city; it was played by Mary Shaw and her company of clever players; created considerable comment in the press and out; excited the mild interest of the police department and other organizations presumably concerned with the suppression of vice, was seen by large audiences of men, women and children, principally women, and went its way. It is back again with its frank argument in favor of Mrs. Warren's profession as a business for women to pursue, in spite of the police will let em; and with its sophisticated brightness shed by George Bernard Shaw's galvanic battery of wit.

A crowd such as the American theater has been stranger to for nearly a month gathered to see the piece and get shocked. They could not have come out of curiosity, so it is fair to presume they liked it. Miss Mary Shaw, at any rate, repeated her remarkable portrayal of Mrs. Warren and earned the curtain calls that ended in a little speech of thanks from the splendid actress whose finest talents are disclosed in this play.

It is only fair to say that she does not make Mrs. Warren's life very alluring, in spite of the author's wit in making the play so. There is no touch of enticing salaciousity—if there is such a thing—in the comedy, and not a suggestion of nymphic pornography. It is all very broad, plain, frank and unnecessary.

A great spatter is made and erudition expended to preach the existence, and the necessity, for the present at least, of such institutions as Mrs. Warren heads and Shaw decries. A tirade is on to convince the convinced. If you like your meat strong; if you are not offended at the discussion of subjects from which women's club exclude their male friends; if you are not obtuse to excellent English and a cleverly built play, "Mrs. Warren's Profession" will entertain you and Shaw will make you think you are thinking.



PLOTS TO DROWN DAUGHTER IN BAY

Father Beguiles His Child to Visit Mother, Then Tries to Kill Her Twice He Attempts to Hurl Girl Over Side of Ferry Boat as Plies on Course

Theodore Thorgensen, an old man who lives with his wife at 1916 Broadway, Oakland, has been acting queerly of late, but when his 16 year old daughter, Josephine, who works as a clerk for Weinstein, Lubin & Co., in this city, got a letter Saturday saying that her mother wished to see her, she did not suspect that it was a ruse contrived by her father's enfeebled mind for the purpose of working injury to her.

Father and daughter walked on the boat together, and Thorgensen led her to a position near the rail. He stood chatting with her for several minutes. As they reached midstream she was terrified to have him seize her roughly and attempt to throw her over the side into the bay. In response to her frightened cries, other passengers rushed up and restrained the excited man. He calmed down and took the matter so quietly, however, that they relaxed their vigilance. Just before the ferry reached the Oakland slip he ran at the girl again and tried to hurl her overboard.

Thorgensen was arrested and brought to the central emergency hospital, where he was placed in straitjacket. He raved incoherently and it was evident that his mind was crazed. Josephine's mother said that he had exhibited slight symptoms of insanity several times in the last few weeks. Save for the severe shock, the girl was not injured.
