Once upon a time there was a fool hen who sat on a china doorknob for three weeks expecting to get a family.


The advertising field is full of "china doorknob propositions"—examples of merchants who expect good newspapers to hatch money out of bad egg business, or who put sound nest eggs under the wrong advertising hen.

There are three principles to follow in an advertising campaign: First of all, find a business that will stand advertising; secondly, find the newspaper that will make the advertising pay; thirdly, give the newspaper time to pay.

You can't start in to breed dollars in less time than it takes to hatch them any more than you can pull a hen off the nest before she has had the chance to incubate.

Advertise something out of which you may reasonably expect returns and when you have found what to advertise, take care that you place your copy in a newspaper that can turn the trick.

RUEF TRIAL JURY FINALLY CHOSEN

Next Move to Delay Hearing Will Be Ach's Effort to Change Venue
Jurors Sworn to Try Abe Ruef

WANTS CALHOUN TO INCRIMINATE FORD

O'Gara Says Next Witness for Prosecution Will Be Thornwell Mullally

Patrick Calhoun, president of the United Railroads, and Thornwell Mullally, his assistant, are to be the "surprise" witnesses for the prosecution in the trial of T. L. Ford.
During the drowsy afternoon session of court before Judge Lawlor yesterday Assistant District Attorney John O'Gara stated that the next witness he desired to put on the stand was Thornwell Mullally.

Detective William Proll, armed with a subpoena for Patrick Calhoun, went to Santa Barbara Monday, but arrived there a few hours after the street railway magnate had started on his return trip to this city.

BOOKS NOT AUDITED
The books of the United Railroads have not been audited since the fire, or since the date upon which it is alleged Ford, the general counsel of the road, bribed Ruef and the supervisors, according to testimony produced yesterday.

DENIES DEPOSIT OF CURRENCY
Dollar testified that he had never deposited any currency in the United Railroads' safe for Ford, nor did he know of the company ever receiving currency from the mint, although after the fire gold coins were secured therefrom to pay the mint's debt.

JURORS GO TO CIRCUIT
Louis N. Slater, who had been private secretary to Frank A. Leach when the latter was superintendent of the San Francisco mint, testified to telegraphic transfers of money from Patrick Calhoun to Ford.

NELSON BREAKS HIS OWN RECORD

Cuts Fifty-six Minutes From Los Angeles Run in a White Steamer

LOS ANGELES, April 28.—Fernando Nelson, who for two years has held the San Francisco-Los Angeles automobile record, lowered his own time 56 minutes today by making the run in 17 hours 17 minutes.
He arrived at 1:19 o'clock tonight with his crew in a White Steamer, and at 10:06 o'clock his son, Frank F. Nelson, started back. His aim is to establish a round trip record and he expects to cover the road north in 30 hours. In coming this way an average of 23 1/2 miles per hour was maintained, and Nelson believes he could have cut his record two hours or more had he not been necessary.

The start from San Francisco was made Tuesday morning at 3:02 P. M. The Hommedieu giving the racer the starting signal. This season is the first time that a White steamer has been sent after the record since it was established by George Hensley in 1905.

EMMA GOLDMAN'S ESCORT A MAJOR

Army Officer, However, Insists He Entertained Anarchist Unawares
Incident Clouds Court Martial of Unknown Sergeant Who Was Friendly

Emma Goldman, the famous anarchist, the one woman whom the federal government has tried every legal method to suppress and who has repeatedly denounced the present forms of government, the United States army and navy, was during her stay here taken around the Presidio and entertained by Major James M. Kennedy of the general hospital.

This startling state of affairs was discovered by the detectives of the local police in trailing the disturber while she was in the city. It was brought out through the efforts of General Funston to discover the identity of a sergeant in the engineering corps who also has shown great friendliness toward her.

"I will draw up the whole force under my command and want the detectives to point the man out," said Funston.
"There is no use for the police to push the matter any further," said Chief Bigby when informed of General Funston's attitude.

Major Kennedy admitted having shown Miss Goldman around the Presidio, but declared he did not know she was the famous anarchist. He said that her manager, Dr. Benjamin Reitman, had accompanied her.

"Dr. Reitman called at the hospital," said he, "and I supposed he was a local practitioner. He introduced a woman by the name of Miss Goldman to me, but I never thought for a single instant that she was the notorious anarchist. I thought they were San Francisco parties and showed them the usual courtesies."

General Funston was exceedingly annoyed over the circumstance.
