League Canvass Causes Alarm in Machine Camp

STRONG MEN FIGHT HERRIN'S OLD GANG MACHINE "PUSH" IS WORRIED BY LEAGUE SCHEMES TO ELECT OPPOSITION TICKET

Character of Delegate Tickets in Thirty-fourth Promises Victory for the League... Railroad Whistle Calls Herrin Workers to Frantic Efforts in the Fortieth... Al Baker Threatens to Work for Delegates and Defeat Regular Republicans

Help of Independent Republican Club Makes Defeat of "Push" Seem Certain... Success of Canvass by Lincoln-Roosevelt Leaders Perplexes Bauer and Schmitt... Herrin Representative in Alameda County Plans to Spring a Surprise at the Polls

In no district in the city are the prospects for the success of the Lincoln-Roosevelt league ticket more encouraging than in the thirty-fourth. The thirty-fourth district independent republican club inaugurated the work in the district for the executive committee of the league, and on that account the campaign opened with a thoroughly equipped organization extending into nearly every precinct.

Among the delegates on the Herrin "push" ticket is J. R. Tyrrell, whose work in the state senate was so satisfactory that he was given an easy job on the water front. Fred V. Severance, another of the "push" delegates, was assemblyman for the district about four years ago and left a perfect Southern Pacific record behind him.

Among the men behind the Herrin ticket are William Gilfoyle, Joe Nylund, Joe Tuite, Charles Rabin, Joe Taaffe, Robert Strable and Jimmy Carroll. Gilfoyle preceded Severance in the assembly, getting his nomination direct from Herrin, who promised his opponents certain rewards if they stepped down. There was nothing to show that Herrin made a bad bargain.

Joe Nylund has been Crimmins' right hand man in the thirty-fourth for years and always boasts that he is a "straight organization man." He has three times a Herrin machine candidate for supervisor, but even the thirty-fourth, usually careless in the matter of politics, refused to stand for him and he was snowed under.

It would be hard to find in all the other assembly districts a gang so representative of Herrin and everything that the "push" stands for as this which is fighting the Lincoln-Roosevelt ticket in the thirty-fourth. Its opposition is regarded as a valuable asset by the league, who prophesy a sweeping victory tomorrow.

Indications are that the "push" is right about this. The Lincoln-Roosevelt ticket in the fortieth is one of the strongest and most representative in the city. It was carefully chosen from the best quality citizens and does not represent a faction, like the "push" ticket. On it are men whose names have been identified in the past with successful anti-Herrin political fights.

Not only has the present campaign aroused widespread interest among republicans who have not taken any part in the movement, but it has stirred an interest among the local leaders which is unusual in view of the fact that no candidates for public office are at issue. There has been no difficulty in Alameda county in getting the attention of politicians, but the party which have at heart the public concern in good government.
