The slaughter of the favorites, which has been an outstanding feature of the racing week at Emeryville, was continued yesterday.

Hannah Louise, the only public choice to make good, May L N was the only other favorite to finish in the money.

Five favorites who were beaten on the day before, rode in such improved form that he was able to win three races, all on outsiders, and his followers were afforded abundant opportunity to recoup their losses of the previous day.
