

PROSECUTOR LAMENTS CHANGE OF FRONT WHICH HE CHARGES TO LOCAL MERCHANTS

SAN LEANDRO, June 12.—An enthusiastic audience of nearly 1,000 persons that crowded St. Joseph's hall, the largest hall in San Leandro, heard Francis J. Heney deliver an address there tonight under the auspices of the newly formed and powerful branch of the Lincoln-Roosevelt republican league.

The noted prosecutor of grafters and exponent of decency in public life talked for nearly three hours and was given the closest attention and repeatedly applauded. C. O. Rineout, president of the Lincoln-Roosevelt league of the branch of San Leandro, acted as chairman. Among those who acted as vice presidents and who were seated on the stage were many of the town's prominent men.

After stating that the objects of the Lincoln-Roosevelt league were to promote decency and honesty in public affairs President Rineout introduced Heney, who was applauded for several minutes. When the opportunity to begin offered, he said:

"This applause reminds me of the receptions I used to receive in San Francisco before we started after the higher-ups. I recall that one year after the fire the Merchants' association gave a banquet at the Fairmont. The 900 merchants and others who were present on that occasion insisted upon calling for Rudolph Spreckels, Burns and myself and hailed us as public benefactors."

"Now it is different. Spreckels, Burns and Heney are no longer welcome at the Merchants' banquets and the door keeper would probably be instructed to keep them out."

"If Abe Ruef and the other grafters and law breakers of San Francisco, now under indictment, are permitted to go unwhipped of justice it will be a reflection upon San Francisco and upon the state of California. And who will be responsible? These same 900 merchants who on April 18, 1907, were for nothing out and out enemies of the law, are now hawking and applauding crime and sympathizing and standing in with criminals."

"One of the main objects of the Lincoln-Roosevelt league in California is to restore government of the people and by the people and do away with the governing of the state by the Southern Pacific company. This can be attained only by breaking the Herrin machine in California and that will be a difficult and arduous thing to do."

"Theodore Bell has undertaken to rid the democratic party in this state of Southern Pacific domination and the Lincoln-Roosevelt league has set out to accomplish the same purpose for the republican party."

FRIENDS OF THE POLICE SURGEON RESENTS CRITICISM AND GIVES ALCOHOLISM AS CAUSE OF DEATH

SPECIAL DISPATCH TO THE CALL. LOS ANGELES, June 12.—Friends of Judson C. Brusie, who died suddenly on Wednesday at a local hospital, to which he was taken after two days in the hospital ward of the city jail, are indignant over the treatment he is alleged to have received while a prisoner.

"It was either a case of let the man die of delirium tremens or induce sleep with drugs and take a chance of saving his life," said Police Surgeon Wiley in reply.

The patient's treatment was correct from a medical point of view. An autopsy would prove this. Alcoholism was given as the cause of Brusie's death.

EULOGY AT FUNERAL. Samuel Shortridge Voices Tribute to Clubman. A large crowd of friends and relatives gathered to pay a last tribute to the memory of Judson C. Brusie, clubman and playwright, whose funeral was held yesterday afternoon.

The floral tributes sent from all parts of the country were among the most beautiful ever seen at a funeral in this city. Among the most striking was a wreath of enchanted carnations, ferns and white watsonia, which completely covered the casket. This was the offering of the relatives.

LIABILITIES OF \$54,872.72 FILED BY QUADT CO. Assets of \$18,543.99 Claimed by Firm in Involuntary Bankruptcy

Schedules of the liabilities and assets of the John Quadt company of San Francisco were filed yesterday in the United States district court in obedience to the involuntary proceedings brought against the company some weeks ago. The unsecured claims were said to be \$54,872.72, and among the creditors mentioned were W. P. Fuller & Co., San Francisco, \$5,932.21, and James Cahill & Co., Oakland, \$7,000. There are also several eastern houses which have large claims. The assets as scheduled included \$18,543.99 in stock and \$9,000.89 in promissory notes and securities, with \$3,124.58 in cash.
