Officers of Order and Delegates to Meeting Assemble in Salinas Today

SAIL FOR SEATTLE
IN FRAIL LAUNCH
Tiny Craft Lydia Begins Voyage Which Makes Mariners Look Dubious

Much interest is manifested along the water front in the voyage of the little yacht Lydia, which sailed from here yesterday, bound for Seattle. This little pleasure craft was built in New York for E. M. Eddy, a Seattle capitalist, and was brought to the coast in the steamer G. W. Fenwick, which arrived here May 1.

Shortly after its arrival here Eddy came down from Seattle and began negotiations to have the Lydia shipped out to the sound on one of the coast steamers. The lowest price that could be obtained for carrying the boat was \$700. Eddy then decided to sail the boat himself.

The Lydia is a peculiar looking little boat, and as it lay at Howard street dock yesterday it presented a very top-heavy appearance. The boatmen of the voyage up the coast shook their heads ominously.

Late Saturday afternoon the little boat left its moorings and made an attempt to put to sea. When it got off the beach, however, it was blown back by a big breeze coming in through the Golden Gate and decided it was better to be inside the bar than out.

On its first sea voyage the crew of the Lydia is as follows: Captain, L. E. Atwater; first mate, G. Cogan; chief engineer, J. Jesson and assistant engineer, James Howerton.
