John M. Byrne Enters Priesthood in Seminary at Menlo Park

Attended by the priests who had fostered his vocation, and surrounded by the student body, companions with him in a course of ecclesiastical training...

At the conclusion of the ordination the newly consecrated priest turned to his widowed mother. Tears mingled with tears as the two embraced each other at the altar steps.

STONE SETTLER'S HEARS NOTHING IN EAST TO HIM WILLING TO HEAD STATE EXECUTIVE BODY

General George Stone is unwilling to accept the chairmanship of the state executive committee of the republican party. Returning from the Chicago convention on the overland, last night he declared that he could not see his way clear to remain at the head of the governing body...

When the executive committee organized prior to the departure of the delegates to Chicago, General Stone was proposed for permanent chairman. He objected to taking the office, but finally allowed himself to be elevated to the position of temporary presiding officer of the committee.

General Stone is receiver of the land office for the San Francisco district, a position which pays him in fees and salaries about \$3,000 a year. Rather than jeopardize this berth he resolved to give up the chairmanship of the executive committee, which he has occupied for some time to the complete satisfaction of the machine.

STILL UNWILLING, HE SAYS

While declaring that his trip east has had no influence on his views of the matter Stone expressed decided unwillingness to accept the proffered honor.
