

Jimmy Gardner Is Too Strong For Whitney in Boxing Bout

Welter Weights Fight Thirteen Rounds, When Eastern Man Is Declared Winner

Jimmy Gardner, the Lowell welter weight, showed the highest development of both the boxer's and the fighter's art in the Coliseum last night when he stopped the upward career of Kyle Whitney, who seemed in line for the championship. The fight went into the thirteenth round when Whitney's seconds tossed a towel into the ring as a signal of defeat.

It is no discredit to say that he had to be fairly shoved into the ring at the beginning of the round which proved to be the last. During the minute's rest which preceded this there was a hurried conversation among his seconds and it seemed to have been agreed to save him further and unnecessary punishment by tossing in the towel. There had been hints of faint-heartedness on the part of Whitney, but he gave no sign of this in his fighting. He simply went as far as tired nature would carry him, and taking an incredible amount of punishment.

Gardner's work was a revelation to the spectators, as he had all the qualities which make a boxer a champion. He cut down Whitney early in the fight, with his left ribs to the body and took much of the fight out of the colored wonder. Had Whitney been up against almost any other man in his class in the world he would probably have won and would have been hailed as one of the greatest of boxers. In Gardner he met a man who had a shade more cleverness than he possessed, and, back of this, the Lowell man had the advantage of a punishing blow with either hand.

TRICK WORKS WELL. Gardner surprised Whitney several times with a little trick which seemed to work well. He would turn his head slightly away from his opponent and would distract the latter's attention. In the same instant he would shoot over a right or left to the head which never missed its mark during the fight. Gardner was full of fight from first to last, while Whitney seemed to do his fighting in fits and starts. He would go after Gardner in a determined way for a time, but would not persevere, and there was never a time when he had Gardner at his mercy.

The fight was a rough one from first to last and the men were forced through the ropes several times. Gardner proved his ability to hit hard by knocking Whitney to his knees several times during the fight. Gardner also went down, but it was more from a slip than from the force of the blow. Whitney has an abnormal reach and he kept his aggressive opponent away from him many times merely by extending his left arm full length. Whitney was not the sting in his blows which would have developed even beyond the form he showed last night.

LARGEST ATTENDANCE. In point of numbers the attendance was the largest seen at a fight here in a long time. The gallery was filled to its capacity long before the first fighters entered the ring, and the police found it necessary to order that no more tickets be sold. The lower gallery was not filled to the same degree, but there were enough spectators there to run the receipts up to about \$10,000. Outside of the Nelson-Atwell fight this was the only night show given here by the new fight trust. Every bout on the card was full of action, as was evidenced by the fact that only one went to the full limit and that was so close as to warrant being called a draw.

No Betting, No Trade Leaders to Attend in Millinery Club Roundup

In spite of this big loss the Coney Island jockey club is not giving up. It is expected that the club will be reorganized and that the Sheepshead Bay track will be sold. The club is not the only place that is suffering a financial loss by the fight against the new fight trust. The dealers in millinery, who for years has catered to the Fifth avenue trade, has lost patronage since the anti-betting laws went into effect. He said:

"In other words, when the racing season was in full swing, I received orders for 500 hats to be ready for Suburban day. This year I received orders for just 12. I'm not the only man who has suffered. All trades feel the loss for the patrons of the races spent their money freely and stimulated trade."

EMPEROR WILLIAMS' YACHT SECOND. KIEL, June 26.—The race for schooners, run in connection with the Kiel regatta, was won by the German yacht, the Meteor, with Emperor Williams personally at the helm. The Meteor finished second, corrected time, behind the Hamburg yacht, the Germania, owned by Lieutenant Krupp von Bohlen and Halbach, husband of the Kaiser's daughter-in-law. The Meteor was expected to lead her first race by more than five minutes.
