Makes Record Time in Trial Race

Priscillian's Performance Shows He Is a Likely Contender for Advance Stake

SHEEPSHEAD BAY, N. Y., June 29.

The victory of Priscillian in the first race was the most interesting of the day's events at the track today. There was a 2 year old stake, the Zephyr, on the program, and the result of the race was surprising, too.

Priscillian won his trial race in a big gallop by five lengths, running the mile in 1:37.5, which is the track record for that distance at Sheepshead Bay. He did not have a great deal to beat, but the ease with which he romped home in record time was impressive.

The advance route is some distance farther, but no one could doubt Priscillian's ability to go on five-sixteenths more, and apparently as much faster as he liked. It was no trick at all for him to gallop away from Peter at Quince in the stretch, and he was never really let down throughout the race.

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Battling Nelson Wagers That Joe Gans Cannot Defeat Him

Dane Is Confident of His Ruggedness

Believes He Can Outstay His Clever Opponent in Long Fight

If Battling Nelson continues to grow stronger at the same rate of progression as has marked his development during the last week it will take some one of greater stature than Willus Britt to hold him down until he meets Joe Gans for the championship Saturday at the Mission street arena.

Nelson's confidence has never been of the wavering kind, and he has claimed in season and out that he can defeat Gans. How he is going to do so is a puzzle to the majority of the spectators who saw their last meeting at Goldfield, when Gans proved much the cleverer boxer.

This last bet seemed to please Nelson, as he figured that to win it Gans will have to go after him in earnest, which will give him a chance to use his peculiar style of fighting in close quarters.

Part of the prediction came true, as Nelson was knocked down and came back for more. Gans did not take to his heels, but stayed with the job.

The men are working their hardest these days and it is commencing to show in their weights. Nelson is lighter now than he was after working out the scales showing 153 1/2 pounds.

Gans went on the road yesterday morning and worked for one day in the gymnasium the afternoon. The principal part of his work was bag punching, as he did not do any boxing.

Referee Jack Wells has been in training at the gymnasium for the past few days. He is expected to referee the fight between Nelson and Gans.

Yesterday the Chicago boxer, arrived here for the fight. Many spectators are expected from a distance. The sale of seats began tomorrow.

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The principal bout on the card will be between the two lightweights, Walter Gorman and Eddie Smith. Gorman is expected to win.

Despite the fact that it was given out on good authority yesterday that Miss May Sutton, world's champion tennis player, would not visit San Francisco and vicinity until September, a close friend of Miss Sutton returned from the southern part of the state today, and announced that he had the champion's promise to play on the Hotel Rafael courts July 11.

According to present arrangements Miss Sutton will play an exhibition tennis match with Miss Hazel Hotchkiss at San Rafael July 11. In view of the fact that the champion is in reality playing under protest the match across the bay will not create the interest it would were the champion to appear at her best.

Miss Sutton's spokesman gave it out yesterday that the champion had expressed no particular desire to meet McLoughlin in an even term on account of her poor condition. She, however, expressed a willingness to meet the coast champion, provided he would allow her a handicap of 15-3-8.
