

Slugging Beavers Use Clubs on Seals

Onslaught of Portlanders Drive Locals to Defeat in Both Games

Falling before the onslaughts of the slugging Beavers the Seals went down to defeat yesterday in the morning game played across the bay and in the one played in the afternoon at Recreation park. The morning score was 3 to 0, and Bobbie Groom by outpitching Ralph Willis was responsible. In the afternoon the score stood 6 to 3. The Portlanders were able to hit Henley harder than the Seals could hit Oie Johnson, but this was not wholly responsible for the lopsided score. Six miscues were made by Henley's following and three of them made by Captain Mohler alone were costly. At that Henley could not have won his game, as in a single inning by clean hitting the Portlanders drove in four runs, enough to have won the game.

The afternoon show was staged before one of the largest crowds of the season. Henley looked all the class compared to Johnson and the Seals figured to win. Starting off like stroke across the Seals had a lead of three runs before the Portlanders broke in with their first, which came in the fifth inning. But even then the fans considered the game safe. They were, however, disillusioned at once, for before the next inning had more than started the first three Beavers up had hit the ball safe and hard, and little Bassey, Portland's left fielder, was lifting the ball over the center field fence. All this occurred before a single batter was out. Henley tightened up, however, and another miscue gave another hit the scoring for the inning was over.

COULD ONLY FILL BASES

After that the best the Seals could do was to fill the bases and let the men die there. Time and again with no outs players were worked around to second and even to third, but always pop flies or futile swings at wide ones started their chances of winning. Five hits, a couple of bases on balls and even an error or two in their favor in the last five innings availed them nothing.

Glenn Henderson, the new outfielder, Berry and Mohler, whose misbehavior in the field brought the wrath of the fans down on his head, each had brilliant chances to win the game for their mates, but not one of them was there with the hit that was needed. Henderson really had a fine chance to win the sixth and again in the eighth the importation from Canada came up with two men on bases. On the first occasion he popped a fly to Casey at second and the other time he was retired on an easy out to the same place. Henry also lost a fine chance to win here in the sixth when with two out and a man on second and third he struck out. Mohler fanned in the ninth with two men on the paths.

The double plays, the beautiful one handed pickup, a throw by ball by Cooney, Bassey's home run and two working line drives to left field done by Rafferty made the game a nerve tingling one for the fans despite the disparity in the score. Of all chances there were crabs by Mohler, who apparently had an off day and could stop nothing that had speed to it. Little Curtis, who played third, also came in for two marks in the error column, but his were more excusable.

ONE RUN AND ONE HIT

One run on one hit in the first inning was made by the Seals. Cooney threw the first ball hit by Mohler into the bleachers and Mohler went to second. On a wild pitch he brought up at third and trotted in a moment later when Zelder lined out a safe one.

In the third an error by Cooney, a single by Williams and another by Mohler gave the Seals two more runs. In the fifth the Beavers began their bombardment of bingles and before it had ceased they were two runs to the good. To make the game doubly seamy they tallied in the sixth when Danzig's and Johnson's hits and Curtis' wild throw to second brought it about.

Before the game the players of both teams indulged in a fungo contest. Oscar Jones proved the fastest player over a 50 yard course, with Rollie Zelder and Bassey close behind him in the other names. Rafferty ran 15 yards in eight seconds, beating Zelder and Jones to the tape but a few inches. "Babe" Danzig stood at the corner of the clubhouse and hit the grandstand in the long distance throw. His exact distance was 235 feet 10 more than Longe's, his nearest competitor. At circling the bases Rafferty again was the fastest. Curtis and Zelder with the same time, 16 seconds, were second. Rafferty's time was 3.5 of a second and better. McArdle hit the target at second base, throwing from the home plate, thereby winning the accuracy contest.

KICK ON DECISION

Navy Ball Tossers Call Game Off for Alleged Bias of Umpire

ALAMEDA, July 4.—The baseball team from the battleship New Jersey and the Krieg & Halton nine of this city played eight innings at Recreation park this afternoon and then quit cold, with the score at 10 to 10. The naval ball tossers were dissatisfied with a decision given by Umpire Bill Brockhoff in the eighth inning, in which he called a strike on the batsman's bat and rolled on four ground back of the plate a fair ball. The batter went to first on the play and a runner came in from third. The New Jersey boys claimed that the decision was wrong. The Krieg & Halton players and the umpire refused to concede from their position and the outlying aggregation declined to go on. The same teams were scheduled to play tomorrow, but the manager of the New Jersey nine said today that his men would not play here in another game.
