## Transport Thomas Sails Today for Manila With Big Load

The transport Thomas will sail at noon today for Manila with its cabin filled to capacity. Among the passengers are Colonel H. M. Bailey, Twenty-ninth Infantry, Lieutenant Colonel N. P. Fisher and family, Major B. B. Hart and wife, Lieutenant Commander W. C. Herbert, U. S. N., and Major Charles B. Muir.

The Thomas will also take besides its big load of cabin passengers 20 enlisted men for the navy and 20 enlisted men for the marine corps at Manila, and 20 enlisted men for the marine corps at Guam.

Captain Lyman will go in command of the transport, and Captain L. D. Cabell will go in command of the ship which will enter Manila harbor.

When the Thomas returns to this port it will undergo repairs of an extensive nature.

**Boat Demolishes Wharf**  
Southern Pacific transfer boat No. 2, bound into the ferry slip at China basin, yesterday morning, tearing down the north side of the wharf. The dock had been only recently repaired.

**Will Receive Visitors**  
The new steamship Tenyo Maru of the Toyo Kisen Kaisha will be open to visitors today and Wednesday. The public will be welcomed without admission tickets.

**Falls of Nith Arrives**  
The British steamer Falls of Nith, Captain Patterson, arrived yesterday, bringing 6,100 tons of coal for the United States government.

**Puglia Reaches San Diego**  
The Italian cruiser Puglia arrived at San Diego yesterday from southern ports. It is to be used as a transport for the warship which will steam up to this port.

**Log Raft Sighted**  
The big log raft containing 5,000,000 feet of lumber in tow of the tug Diana was sighted off the coast yesterday by the steamer Rosa City. The raft is being towed to San Diego.

**Lumber Barge Sinks**  
The barge Alabama, lying in China basin, sprang a leak yesterday and partially sank. The barge, which was carrying lumber, slipped overboard and floated around the bay. Much of it was picked up and landed at different points along the front.

**Saginaw Uninjured**  
The coasting steamer Saginaw, Captain Stream, which was in collision off Point San Pedro with the schooner Zampagna Saturday, was uninjured yesterday morning and in the afternoon started for Grays Harbor.

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# Parting Shots of Rev. Calvert E. Smoot Returned by Minister of Calvary

Rev. Calvert E. Smoot, former pastor of the Second Unitarian church, who, in resigning from his charge last Sunday, said that the church has lost its spiritual leadership, was answered in kind by the Rev. William A. Rader yesterday morning.

Rev. Rader, who resigns his pastorate, presumably the ministry, and who in leaving gives a parting kick, not at the devil but at the church," said he, referring to Smoot, "if the church is falling, as he says, it is because of ministers like the man who last Sunday denounced it."

Rev. Rader declared the church was the promulgator of every praiseworthy institution. During the course of his sermon Dr. Rader referred to the local graft process, making a plea for civic righteousness.

"There is spiritual wickedness in high places here," said he. "You who are in the church, you who have promised to support the gospel and truth of the Lord Jesus Christ, and who go your way supinely satisfied if conventions have not been disregarded, what are you doing toward the great cause of the world's redemption?"

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# MAKES PLEA FOR PEACE Visiting Minister Declares Law of Love True Patriotism

"There is but one fulfilling of the law, which is love," said Rev. Thornton Anthony Mills, pastor of the Christian Union church at Rockford, Ill., in an address at Golden Gate hall last evening on "The New Patriotism."

"We do not need a navy for protection. When America had practically no navy she was never invaded, but Russia, with one of the largest navies in the world, was attacked and conquered by a few thousand men."

Rev. John M. Byrne, who was recently ordained to the priesthood, preached his first sermon yesterday morning at St. Mary's cathedral, the occasion being the celebration of solemn high mass for the feast of St. Peter and St. Paul.

At St. Mary's the Paulists celebrated the feast of St. Paul with high mass at 10 o'clock. Rev. Thomas Moore of Berkeley preached the sermon and Father Henry Stark sang the mass.
