Presidential Campaign Grows Warmer in East

REPUBLICAN LEAD TAKEN BY TAFT ON TARIFF
Nebraskan Decides to Attempt Capture of Empire State With His Oratory
Commoner Ends Day of Conferences With Street Speech Asking for Funds

CHICAGO, Aug. 22.—William J. Bryan will make a determined effort to place New York state in the democratic column. Plans to this end were carefully laid today at a three hours conference of Bryan, National Chairman Mack, heads of the various bureaus of the national committee, a member of the executive committee at democratic headquarters shortly after Bryan's arrival here from Des Moines.

It was developed at the conference that Bryan would make a sharp fight in the middle west, while John W. Kern, the democratic presidential candidate, would be called upon to make an extended tour of the Pacific coast states. Former National Chairman Thomas Taggart declared that Indiana would surely go for Bryan and that the republicans were using money to divide the labor vote. Governor Haskell of Oklahoma declared that Oklahoma would give Bryan 50,000 plurality and that the state would contribute \$50,000 to the campaign fund, of which \$27,000 had already been raised.

It was the opinion of those taking active part in the deliberations that the most effective campaign for Bryan would be to make speeches in the principal centers, and then to carry the fight through West Virginia, Maryland, Delaware, New Jersey and New York state. It was decided to call a meeting of the full committee, with the various subcommittees, September 8 at 10 o'clock in this city. Progress Pleases Bryan
Bryan told the committee that he was delighted with the progress that he had observed, and that while he had a few suggestions to make he felt that the work could not have been carried out more efficiently and thoroughly. He expressed himself as pleased with the prospect for democratic success in November.

It was learned tonight that the visit of Bryan to New York was arranged not only with the full acquiescence of those now in the direction of the democratic party in that state, but to no small degree by their desire to have Bryan take an active part in the New York state campaign. Chairman Mack said tonight: "We talked today on various subjects and heard reports from the different bureaus which were very favorable. Bryan said they could not be better than the present campaign. We have made for the campaign. No definite dates for Bryan's speaking trips were made. He will confine his speaking to the principal centers in the middle west and doubtful states."
BRYAN ASKS FOR FUNDS
Standing in a carriage in the middle of Congress street between the Auditorium and Auditorium Annex hotels and before a crowd that completely choked the thoroughfares for nearly half an hour tonight Bryan outlined the uses to which democratic clubs can be put in the present campaign. He was repeatedly interrupted by applause and shouts of "Good, good."
Bryan spoke of the work of the club bureau and said it was the intention to organize in every precinct in the United States. He said that the club bureau made a further plea for popular subscriptions and estimated that the democratic national ticket this year would muster 8,000,000 votes. If each club could contribute to the fund 25 cents, he said, an ample campaign fund would be secured.

"We have no way of coercing the people, even if we wanted to," he declared amid shouts of applause. "We have only the force of our ideas of promising governmental favors in return. Inasmuch as we expect to give special privileges to none, there are none to whom we can go and make a special appeal."
TURKEY SEEKS TO ANNUL OLD REGIME'S GRANTS
Desires Cancellation of Concessions to France and England. Obtained by Bribery
ST. PETERSBURG, Aug. 22.—A dispatch received here from Constantinople says that the porte has directed the Turkish ambassadors at London and Paris to enter into negotiations with the French and British owners of concessions in the Balkans, with the idea of bringing about the annulment of these privileges by mutual consent.
The present Turkish cabinet considers that these concessions, secured under the old regime through bribery and in violation of the constitution, should be returned to the owners of the concessions in question refuse to relinquish the matter will be submitted to The Hague.

ROME, Aug. 22.—Gonzalo de Quesada, the Cuban minister at Washington, and his wife and children were today received by the pope in private audience. Conversing about Cuba, the pope spoke highly of Monsignor Aversa, the apostolic delegate to Cuba and Porto Rico, and expressed the hope that the republic would prosper by the paths of peace and prosperity. The pontiff made presents to Mrs. de Quesada and his children.

WIFE BEAT TO DEATH BY EX-CONVICT ARRESTED FOR BRUTAL TREATMENT OF SPOUSE ATTEMPTS SUICIDE IN CELL

Harry Wanko, an ex-convict, who brutally beat and kicked his young wife in their room at the North Star hotel, Lombard and Mason streets, Thursday night, was arrested early yesterday morning by Policemen Stelzer and Dougherty on a charge of assault with intent to do grievous bodily harm.
After being searched at the city prison Wanko was put in a cell, where he produced a small vial containing laudanum, which he had secreted, and swallowed the contents. Other prisoners in the cell gave the alarm and Wanko was hurried to the central emergency hospital, where several hours to bring him out of danger and he was returned to the prison.
Wanko was released from San Quentin on June 15, after serving three years for attempting to break jail in Monterey while awaiting trial for a misdemeanor. Soon after being released he met Jennie Smith of Oakland and they were married. They had been living at the North Star hotel and on Friday night he went to their room in an intoxicated condition. He accused her of being too familiar with other roomers. This she denied. He then struck her with his fists, knocked her down and kicked her on the head and body till she became unconscious.
Wanko was arrested here on April 27, 1904, and served six months in the county jail. He called upon a Miss Anna Wilson, representing that he came from the district attorney's office, and obtained from her a diamond ring which the police had recovered from a man whom she had charged with stealing it, saying it was wanted as evidence. He pawned the ring. After serving his sentence he went to Monterey, where he became a cooper. Wanko had brief liberty yesterday, securing release on \$50 cash bail. In the evening, however, the condition of his wife became more serious and he was rearrested.

UNKNOWN MAN DESCRIBED AS A MEXICAN JUMPS FROM THE STEAMER BAY CITY CHANGES MIND ABOUT SUICIDE, BUT TENDER REACHES HIM TOO LATE

An unknown man, young, well dressed and of dark complexion, committed suicide yesterday afternoon by jumping overboard from the ferry steamer Bay City on the 4:15 trip from Oakland. A boat was launched, but the man sank before it reached him. The man, described by those who saw him, was a Mexican. Before taking the fatal leap he removed his hat, bowed courteously to those about him and announced in matter of tone: "This is the end of the world for some of us." Then, before those who saw him realized his intention he vaulted lightly over the rail and fell with a splash into the water. The chill of the brine seems to have awakened a desire in the man to postpone the end as far as he was concerned, for he struck out and swam vigorously. The steamer was stopped and a boat was launched. The man was still in sight, swimming strongly when the boat reached the water, but just as the boat was near enough for the man to be grabbed he sank and was seen no more.
