

GRAY BROTHERS DEFEY AUTHORITIES

Blasting Is Started Anew at the Castro Street Quarry Without Permit Residents in Vicinity Started at Early Hour by Explosion

Blasting operations were resumed yesterday morning at Gray Brothers' quarry, Thirtieth and Castro streets, although their permit was rescinded by the board of supervisors after the destructive blast last week when three children of the Clement school were injured and several buildings damaged.

The bankers' investment company applied for a permit yesterday to erect a four-story class A building to be located at the southeast corner of Geary street and Grant avenue, and to cost \$200,000.



Green Corn Omelet—Grate six ears of corn; add four well beaten eggs, one tablespoonful of flour, one cupful of milk. Season with salt and pepper. Beat all together and bake for one-half hour.

Celery au Gratin—Cook until tender a large bunch of celery cut into one inch lengths. Drain, return to the saucepan and cover with equal part of white sauce. Season with salt and pepper and chopped parsley. When cold butter a baking dish and cover the bottom with crumbs. When the celery is cold add to it two well beaten eggs. Cover with crumbs and bits of butter. Bake one-half hour.

Watermelon for a First Course—Cut chilled watermelon in halves; then take a spoon of such size as one prefers and imbed it firmly, point downward, in the red pulp of the melon. Turn the spoon in a circle and take out the cone shaped piece thus produced. Serve two or more, according to size, on a plate of chopped ice. Grape leaves give a pretty finish to the dish.

German Municipalities Have a Unique Method of Assisting the Unemployed

In a report to the department of commerce and labor at Washington, D. C., Vice Consul W. A. Leonard at Kehl, Germany, tells of the public employment bureaus, whose services in placing laborers are gratuitous. These exist in all the larger cities and towns of Alsace-Lorraine and are being used or less developed in all parts of Germany. He says:

Fifteen different municipalities of Alsace-Lorraine are joining from 1900 to 1907, to conduct employment bureaus which aim to keep in close touch with the various organizations of employers and employees in every case it is the aim of the city to give the directorship of these employment bureaus only to city officials who can work harmoniously and effectively with employers and the laboring element.

At the monthly meeting of the San Francisco typographical union last Sunday it was decided to send six delegates to the convention of the state federation of labor. The committee on picnic reported that all arrangements for this event had been completed. During the month 41 cards were deposited and 27 issued. Three candidates were initiated, six applications were received, one member asked to be placed on the veterans' list and two more applications to be admitted to the printers' home.

At the last meeting of plumbers' and gas fitters' union No. 1 it was announced that during the parade on Labor day the union will be preceded by the girls' drum corps of Genevieve parlor of the Native Daughters of the Golden West. The members of the union will appear in new uniforms, consisting of black cap, black sateen shirt, red tie, blue overalls, and will carry red, white and blue sashes. Each will have a red brassard on the right arm. Frank Vivian will be the march of the union.

The glass blower's union of this city has been advised that the representatives of the international union of glass blowers of America won a notable victory on the last day of the conference with the manufacturers at Atlantic City, when they obtained a wage scale at the same figures and same hours as prevailed last year.

From and after October 1 in the state of New York the inspection of mercantile houses as to sanitary conditions for those employed there will be taken from the health boards and placed in the hands of the department of labor.

An extraordinary meeting will be held tonight in the temple of the membership of the telephone operators' union; at which many matters of unusual importance will be brought up.

He was brought from Grand Rapids, Mich., on a warrant sworn to by Miss Catherine Libby of 233 Dolores street, who accuses him of getting \$4,000 from her and her sister Alice April to bet on a horse at the Emeryville track and disappearing with the coin.

GRAND JURY TO INVESTIGATE The grand jury will investigate the actions of John J. Lynch, stock broker, now charged with a felony embezzlement for selling five bonds valued at \$1,900 each, hypothecated to him for a loan of \$10,000. The cases are pending in Police Judge Weller's court. Lynch, who is still in the city prison, was served with a subpoena yesterday to appear before the grand jury this morning.
