Green Seal Breaks Record on Closing Days of Seattle Race Meeting

SEATTLE, Sept. 12.—The racing season of 1908 at The Meadows closed today in a veritable "blaze of glory." The day was perfect and one of the biggest crowds of the season thronged the inclosure and was rewarded by witnessing racing that was brilliant. The most notable incident of the day was the smashing of the American record for a mile and a sixteenth by Green Seal in winning the Alaska handicap, the final stake of the season. Green Seal was in fine fettle and, making his own pace every inch of the way, ran the distance in 1:44 2/5, which clipped one-fifth of a second from the record heretofore held jointly by Glassful and Israelite, the former's mark having been made at Washington park in 1903 and Israelite's at Brighton Beach in 1905.
