AMERICAN PLUCK  
WINS IN BRAZIL  
Indians, Fever and All Obstacles Overcome in Superhuman Work of Building Roads

Yankee Engineers Take Up the Task When Men of Other Countries Fail

Will it be left to American railroad engineers to accomplish the almost superhuman task of building a railway into the heart of South America? At present there is a small party in the heart of Brazil fighting fever, wild beasts and hostile Indians in the primeval forests of that unknown land, laying steel rails to bring untouched riches to civilization.

The task has been undertaken by English engineers, who after a short time on the work were deserted by their crews and were left alone in pathless forests to find their way back to the settlements.

FIRST ATTEMPT MADE IN 1779

When the flag of Portugal floated over Brazil the wealth of this unknown country was realized by explorers and we have records of one Thaddeus Haenke, who in 1779 offered his services to the king of Portugal, to open up this region.

CANALS ARE SUGGESTED

In 1861 General Quentin Quevedo of the Brazilian army went down the rapids of the Madeira river and suggested a system of canals in the southern country to get the products of the land to the Atlantic.

In 1871 the government of Bolivia placed a loan of \$3,500,000 in London. A railroad company was organized and railroad material to the value of \$3,000,000 was shipped to Brazil, then down the Amazon river to where the Madeira leaves the main stream.

AMERICANS TAKE UP WORK

On April 13, 1907, a party of engineers was organized and shortly after 50 engineers from Philadelphia left New York for the Amazon river. They were men who had built railroads in all parts of the world and one of them, C. Breziz, is well known in this state. A letter from him was received yesterday by the city engineer, and in this city who was also to have joined the party, but was prevented at the last moment from going. Breziz writes as follows:

"I sailed from New York on March 25, arriving at Fort S6u Antonio May 4, which is in the heart of Brazil and about 600 miles from the mouth of the Amazon. The Madeira Mamore is a proposed railway which is to begin at San Antonio and end at a point on the Mamore river, about 250 miles. This river leaves the Madeira at the falls and runs southeast into the heart of the continent of South America."
