Laconic Message Accompanies Gift of Gold From Unknown Man in Woods

Goos to Assist a Student Who Is Working His Way in University

BERKELEY, Sept. 26.—President W. H. West of the University of California made public today one of the most unique ways in which an unknown donor has placed in his hands a scholarship available for a university student.

"Last evening a man called at my house and said he was there as a messenger for a man whom I would probably think was a sort of crank. This man, he said, lived 'up in the woods' and I either gathered or inferred from what he said that the man was a miner somewhere up in northern California.

"He did not even seem himself to approve very much of the donor's action; it seemed to strike him as rather weird. 'Rather queer way,' he said, 'to help a young fellow by giving him money. I've never seen it to do any thing but hurt him. I should put the money in the hands of the regents of the University of California and use it as a loan fund for deserving students who were working their way through college.'
