ONLY ASSERTIONS, SAYS CHIEF. "I have nothing to do with the case," said Biggy. "What can I do? These charges as yet are nothing but assertions. I would like to make any formal accusation against Captain Duke, let him do it in the proper way. Let him make affidavits and then we can try him."

TIERNY UNGRATEFUL. Captain Duke not only entered an absolute denial, but stated that he had upon previous occasions befriended Tierney. "It is true," said Duke, "that I was at Powell and Eddy streets Monday. I was on my way to attend a drill. But I did not see Tierney and he was not with me. Tierney is certainly a most ungrateful person to say such a charge against me. When he was on the police force I befriended him during the Chinatown trouble. I testified in his behalf in one case, and for two years he has not spoken to me on that account."

TIERNY OPPOSES ACTION. It appears that Tierney's application for a police promotion was originally presented 17 days ago. He wanted to open a place in Mason street between Eddy and Ellis in conjunction with his partner, Maguire. In conformity with the regulations it was presented to the commission in the afternoon of the 15th. Duke was away and it was applied for by the property owners and by Acting Captain Eugene Wall. WASHINGTON, Oct. 1.—"Of more importance than any other feature in the crusade against the scourge of the white plague is the campaign of education," said Dr. Koch, the eminent German scientist, who today again figured prominently in controversial discussion of tuberculosis before the international congress of children held here.

MOTHER OF GOVERNOR DEMANDS ACCOUNTING. VICTORIA, B. C., Oct. 1.—A statement of claim has been filed in the case brought against Lieutenant Governor Dunsmuir by his mother, Mrs. J. O. Dunsmuir, claiming that the lieutenant governor since 1899 has acted as manager and agent of the family estate, including all the interests in the mines and railway on Vancouver island and San Francisco, involving about \$15,000,000.

NEW RAILROAD INCORPORATED. CHEYENNE, Wyo., Oct. 1.—Articles of incorporation were filed today for the Montana, Wyoming and Southern railway, with a capital of \$5,000,000. The company plans the construction of a line from northern Oregon to Miles City, Mont., and may also extend southward to the present terminus of the Great Northern.

FIVE KILLED IN WRECK. PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 1.—A work train on the logging railroad of the Chaoman logging company was wrecked about five miles west of Scappoose this afternoon. Five men were killed and eight were injured. The wrecked train was brought to Portland and taken to the Good Samaritan hospital. Six of the injured are seriously hurt.

CHICO HOMES ARE BURNED. CHICO, Oct. 1.—A fire, started in the home of Roy Landry last night by a lamp exploding, destroyed seven residences, besides the Landrys, who were homeless families of J. C. Steeper, J. Hollingshead, J. L. Gouldard, D. F. Lightfoot, M. H. Davis and J. H. Groat. The property loss is about \$10,000.

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BANKERS OPPOSE GUARANTEE PLAN

Go on Record Against Such Action by State or Federal Governments. DENVER, Oct. 1.—The thirty-fourth annual convention of the American bankers' association came to an end this afternoon with the election of George M. Reynolds of Chicago president and Lewis E. Pierson of New York first vice president. Thirty-eight new members were announced and a vice president representative in the states having representatives in the association was named. The convention also placed itself squarely on record as against both the proposition to guarantee bank deposits and to establish postal savings banks. A lively discussion occurred over the report of the federal legislative committee opposing both the guarantee of bank deposits and the establishment of postal savings banks. The resolution offered by the committee, however, contained a condemnation of the guarantee law only, making no mention of postal savings banks. A fight led by Clifton R. Breckenridge of Arkansas was made to include condemnation of postal savings banks in the same resolution. Former Governor Myron T. Herrick was the leader in opposition to a substitute offered by Breckenridge condemning both propositions in one resolution. After a parliamentary tangle during which several of the delegates were sharply called to order by the president, the Breckenridge substitute was voted down.

STEAMER HUMBOLDT FLOATED. SEATTLE, Oct. 1.—At 8:15 o'clock tonight the steamer Humboldt was successfully floated after being ashore for about 10 hours. The steamer was in tow of the tug Maude and started in tow for Victoria, where she will probably be repaired.
