### Freshmen Prepare for Football Battle

California and Stanford Rugby Teams Appear to Be Almost Evenly Matched

Arrangements are completed for the freshman game between California and Stanford universities Saturday. The officials have been selected and approved. Special trains will be run to Palo Alto Saturday, the first one drawing out at 8:20. A large attendance is expected and a number of automobile parties will make the run to Palo Alto. A special part of the ground near the football field has been set aside for autos.

The squads have been reduced to a minimum. The Stanford squad numbers 19 and the California 24. The final teams will be selected either today or tomorrow. The captains probably will be named by the coaches today. For California it is said that Evans is likely to be chosen. The Stanford captain is hard to pick, but Erb looks like the right man for the honor. He plays at scrum half, a good position to control the team from, and he has had considerable Rugby experience in Vancouver.

The coaches at both universities are devoting all their energies to the freshmen, and by Saturday the teams ought to be in the very best condition. The general knowledge on the laws of the game this year is much greater than any previous freshman team has shown, and both Stanford and California baby teams are playing excellent Rugby.

California seems to have a trifle the best of the argument.

Stanford's chances of victory this year appear brighter than any year since 1904. California has captured every freshman game since that year, in 1906, when Rugby was started. California won. Last year they also won decisively. This year it looks like an even contest.

### Five Days' Race Meet on a Fast Track

Noted Horses Arrive and High Class Events Are on the Program

UKIAH, Oct. 13.—A five days' race meeting opened on the local track today with a large attendance. This was the first time for several years that thoroughbreds faced the barrier on this track, which was conceded by horsemen to be the fastest in the state.

Two carloads of horses arrived from Emeryville today, while many have been arriving daily from the north. Seventy-five running and trotting horses will take part in the different events during the next four days and high class racing is expected.

A carload of trotters will be shipped from Santa Rosa Friday to be entered in stake events during the last two days. Only three races were run today on account of many of the horses just being taken from the cars, but during the remaining days from five to seven races are entered for each day.

UKIAH is an open town, and all gambling allowed under the state law is permitted. Results of today's races:

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Oct. 13.—The fall season of athletics among the women students of Stanford university was inaugurated yesterday, when the girls who aspire for positions on the basketball team signed at Robie gymnasium and held their first practice. The ranks of the players of last year were not badly thinned by graduation, and the young women were enthusiastic over the prospect of turning out a team which shall bring home a varsity victory when they meet the coeds of the blue and gold next semester.

Today the girls who will play hockey signed the lists and within the next few days will hold their first practice.

The members of the Stanford tennis club have decided to reorganize and place the English sport upon a more energetic basis here. All of the former varsity men are backing the movement and it is believed a series of championship tournaments will be held before the rains set in to bring out the talent of the under classes. The men who are active in the agitation are R. A. Gott of Alameda, A. J. Goward of San Francisco, T. C. Henry of Los Angeles and Horace Mann of San Francisco.

The big rally and sendoff which is always given the cardinal freshmen football players before the intercollegiate season is held in Assembly hall Thursday night. This will be the first big open rally of the semester at which all the community will gather. Elaborate preparations are being made by the yell leaders and the "stunts" committee, and the rosters will be led in procession about the hall and illumination of red fire. The coaches and Trainer Houghton will speak, as will other well known members of the student body.

#### Six Cylinder 1909 Car Is Great Surprise to Enthusiasts

Of all the new cars coming to the coast this season the 1909 Winton six cylinder has been heralded with the least publicity. The Kitchen Keeper has her own ideas as to the arrangement of the various kitchen utensils. Some use the doors on separate hooks. One kitchen recently observed has a shallow cabinet in which the thickness of the partition, which is fitted with a series of racks, which hold the covers of the various saucepans. Underneath are hooks on which the pans are hung, bottom side out. Sometimes the space beneath the dresser is used for this purpose.

In regard to kitchen furniture, one or two tables are necessary, and should be proportionate in size to the surroundings. The old fashioned wooden table is still much employed, and covered with oilcloth, serves the purpose well. A marble or a glass top, however, is much better, since it can be removed and thoroughly cleaned. Drawers beneath the table are handy to hold towels, knives, spoons and other useful articles. The legs of the table should be sturdy and set squarely on the floor. Rubber supports prevent slipping and should always be used.

As a rule there is little room for chairs. Rooking chairs are a nuisance and undesirable in this department.

The refrigerator, while not distinctly a part of the kitchen furniture, should always be placed near at hand. A closet leading from the kitchen is the best place for its location. A shelf above it for food while the refrigerator is being cleaned is an excellent idea and saves many steps for the house keeper.

The modern house keeper realizes the importance of the kitchen and its appointments, and in the course of a few years many improvements will be noted and put into effect. It is a spot where the mistress of the house spends many hours each day, and it should therefore be as pleasantly and commodiously arranged.

A Hint for Fruit Canning (Mrs. M. Hellman, 8 Harmon court, Oakland)—In canning fruit, a teaspoonful of bleach placed in each can will positively prevent souring and fermentation.

To Remove Ink or Iron Stains (Mrs. J. W. Christie, 387 Eighteenth street, San Francisco)—Fresh ink or iron stains may be removed by washing the spot with hot solution of oxalic acid and then rinsing thoroughly in warm water. Oxalic acid is a poison and should be kept away from the reach of children.


