BADLY INJURED COERCED
SAVING WITNESSES

Prosecution Tries to Sustain
Contention in Case of
Mrs. Martin

Woman Turned Hose on Boy,
Dragged Him by Hair and
Beat Him

OAKLAND, Nov. 6.—Neighbors of Mrs. Sabella J. Martin, Twenty-first street, were in court today to sustain the contention of the prosecution that the woman had acquired complete ascendancy over the mind of Baby John Martin by her alleged brutal treatment. That Mrs. Martin cornered the boy in the yard, drenched him with a garden hose, yanked him into the house with her fingers entwined in his locks and beat him until others intervened, was the testimony.

SPECIAL CABLE TO THE CALL
BUDAPEST, Nov. 6.—The entire Danube flotilla is now at Semlin practicing with "live" shells. The railway bridge over the river at that point is safe, as an extra guard was placed over it. There is an incessant movement of stores from Belgrade to Nish, which would be the principal capital of Serbia in case of war with Austria.

LONDON, Nov. 7.—The correspondent of the Times at Belgrade in a dispatch says: "A complete change in the situation here in the last few days seems to justify the anticipation that all immediate danger of war in the Balkans has been removed. This change is due to the firm attitude of the powers toward the impracticable schemes of territorial compensation."

BULGARIA DISPLEASED
Asks Russia to Urge Turkey to
Modify Demands

ST. PETERSBURG, Nov. 6.—The agent of Bulgaria here has been instructed to make representations to Russia that the terms proposed by Turkey for a settlement of the difficulties growing out of the Bulgarian declaration of independence are entirely unacceptable and to request that Russia unite with the other powers in the use of influence to compel Turkey toward securing a modification of the attitude of the Porte in the premises.

HUSBAND OFFSETS
HIS WIFE'S CHARGES

John E. Henderson Answers Di-
vorce Complaint by Involving
Names of Three Men

Has Long List of Grievances,
but Court Orders Him to
Pay Alimony

OAKLAND, Nov. 6.—Mrs. Maud Anna Henderson named two women in charges which she made against John E. Henderson, former clergyman and undertaker, in addition to a long list of alleged crimes for which she asked a divorce. Henderson replied today by naming three men and appending a longer list of grievances in a denial of his wife's charges.

John Graham, George Green and Clarence Marshall were named by Henderson as persons with whom his wife had been unduly intimate. In her complaint she named Evelyn Davis, Sacramento and Dell Estey of Oakland.

GERMANY REJECTS
FRENCH PROPOSAL

Government Insists That France
Express Regrets at Casa
Blanca Affair

PARIS, Nov. 7.—The Matin's Berlin correspondent says: "It is declared in official circles late tonight that Germany has rejected the French proposal submitted by Ambassador Cambon, and that the government insists on France expressing regrets at the action of the French soldiers at Casa Blanca toward an official of the German consulate."

CITIZEN'S PAPERS ARE
TAKEN FROM POLITICIAN

Superior Court of Marin County
Reduces Herman Ferrario
to Rank of Alien

SAN RAFAEL, Nov. 6.—Herman Ferrario, who for a number of years has been one of the prominent politicians in the Italian colony at San Rafael, for 20 years a resident of the United States and several times a delegate to county conventions in Marin county, was deprived of his citizenship papers in the superior court today.

WOMAN CHARGES KIDNAPING

SAN RAFAEL, Nov. 6.—Mrs. Walter Sharpe, who says that her husband deserted her and that his mother in law stole her two children and then departed for Salt Lake City with them last week, came to San Rafael today to file a charge of kidnaping. She wanted a warrant for her husband's arrest on the charge of kidnaping. When she found that such procedure was impossible until the court decided in whose charge the children should be placed, she came to San Rafael to see her lawyer about getting a divorce. Mrs. Sharpe is living in San Francisco.

DIVORCE FOR MRS. LEWIS

SAN RAFAEL, Nov. 6.—An interlocutory decree of divorce was granted Mrs. Jennie Lewis from John Lewis on the ground of desertion by Judge T. J. Lennon this afternoon. Four years ago the Lewis were a well-to-do family. Without warning the husband deserted his family and threw the whole burden of caring for the hungry children on his wife. She was left without means of support and was compelled to go to work in the Dipsea hotel at Bolinas. Since his disappearance Lewis has sent no word as to his whereabouts.

BIG IMPROVEMENTS
FOR MARE ISLAND

Board of Military Engineers
Recommends Expenditure in
Work of \$1,797,000

WASHINGTON, Nov. 6.—Important recommendations for improving Mare Island strait and the approaches thereto are contained in the report of the board of military engineers of the army and navy, and an estimate is made of \$1,797,000 for the work, this amount to include a self-contained and self-propelling dredge, which will require about \$125,000 a year to maintain.

YOUNG COSTA RICAN
SAVES SCHOOLMATES

Rubena Herrera Arouses Sleep-
ing Students During Burn-
ing of Building

WASHINGTON, Nov. 6.—Thrilling escape and heroic rescue work by a Costa Rican student, Ruben Herrera, marked a fire which early today burned to the ground the Bliss electrical school in North Takoma, a suburb of Washington, D. C., partially insured. More than 150 students in the dormitories were awakened to find the building in flames and escaped by their quick wits, many jumping from second story windows, while others slid down ropes to safety.

ELECTION RIOTS IN PORTUGAL

LEISURE, Nov. 6.—Election disorders occurred today at Porto de Moz. A local progressive leader fired a revolver from a window into a passing parade, killing two persons. From the ranks of the procession a crowd infuriated men rushed toward the building from which the shots had been fired and it was with difficulty that the troops rescued the assassin.

FORMER OHIO ADJUTANT GENERAL
DEAD

LORENZ, Nov. 6.—Arthur L. DeWolfe, 45 years old, who was adjutant general under Governor James E. Campbell of Ohio from 1880 to 1882, died at the Hotel St. Lorenz from cancer of the stomach.

MERCHANTS PLEASE
SUFFRAGE LEAGUE

Berkeley Chamber of Commerce
Adopts Resolution Urging
Submission Question

Clubwomen Rejoice Over Unani-
mous Action of Organization
on Their Petition

BERKELEY, Nov. 6.—Directors of the Berkeley chamber of commerce went on record last night in favor of the woman suffrage movement by a unanimous vote. The workers for the cause of equal suffrage in this city were elated over the success of their petition to the chamber in view of the rebuke which former Secretary E. D. Burrows administered on account of the speech made by Mrs. William Keith, president of the local suffrage club, on the occasion of the opening of the chamber of commerce headquarters in Center street a year ago.

No Such Thing in California as
Nonassessable Shares, Rules
Oakland Judge

Statutes of Dakota Fail to Hold
