Two fine apartment buildings will be erected in Telegraph avenue between Forty-second and Forty-third street.

LECTURER OPPOSES WEDDING FOR HOME

Professor Charles Zueblin Declares Chief Object in Life Is Children's Care

Society for Ethical Culture Urged to Promote Unions and Protect Offspring

CHICAGO, Nov. 8.—An attack on marriage as a means for women to obtain support for themselves and their children was made by Prof. Charles Zueblin today in a lecture on "Education and Life" before the Society for Ethical Culture in Handel hall.

"We must teach all our children the meaning of sex, and our girls the meaning of motherhood," he said. "Our chief obligation in this life is the care of children. It should be our chief occupation, it comes ahead of any spiritual satisfaction. There is no other equal to the enjoyment of the care of children."
