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Seal of Leland Stanford Junior University adopted by trustees

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Undergraduate of Economics Department Chosen President of Encina Hall

Other Officers for the Big Dormitory Are Named for the Next Semester

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Dec. 4.—John Parks Hemphill, a senior in the economics department of Stanford university, was elected to the presidency of Encina club last night and will govern the affairs of the big dormitory next semester. This office is one of the most desired undergraduate honors as the organization of which Hemphill has been elected executive officer comprises 300 men students.

Hemphill has taken an active part in college affairs, and especially in Encina club matters. He was formerly a director and a member of the house committee which regulates the big dormitory. Other officers were also named for the next semester.

For the house committee A. F. Meeson of Santa Barbara, G. P. George of Los Angeles and H. S. Warren of Glendora were chosen. The board of directors, consisting of two men from each class, was selected as follows: G. R. Wells of Santa Ana, J. B. Swickard of San Jose, A. E. Cook of Santa Barbara, C. H. Voss of Stockton, R. J. Miller of Hanford, J. E. Elliott of Pacific Grove, G. B. Lantz of Colton and R. S. Worthington of Alameda.

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Dec. 4.—Because their parents told them to go back to college and give up thoughts of matrimony for the time being, two well known Stanford juniors created a stir in campus circles by suddenly making up their minds to get married, and in a sensational manner made a trip to San Jose this morning and were united. Miss Norine M. Graves of Los Angeles and Robbins Little of Pasadena are the principals in the affair.

The wedding was effected by the agency of an automobile and an obliging clergyman in San Jose. Taking a sorority sister into her confidence, Miss Graves met Little at an early hour this morning and joined him and a party of his friends who were along as best man. At San Jose Rev. David Gresham performed the ceremony, and the party returned here to break the news.

The romance of Miss Graves and Little started soon after they both registered in the university in the fall of 1906. Their engagement was kept a secret until a few weeks ago, when they called out Miss Graves to tell their parents of their intended union. Consent was not secured for an immediate marriage and the two students returned to the campus.

Little was prominent here as an athlete. He captained his freshman Rugby team and played on the 1910 Interclass baseball team. He was a member of the 1910 Quad board. Miss Graves was well known and popular. She registered from Los Angeles, where she is well known. She is also a member of the 1910 Quad board.

After bringing back the two students who had been taken to San Jose to witness the ceremony, the bride and groom left the campus for San Miguel, where Little is to take a cattle ranch. They will live in San Miguel.
