

COFFEY ARRANGED FOR TAKING BRIBES

Attorney Franklin P. Bull Secures Continuance for Defendant to Plead

Judge Dunne Says That Preliminary Motions Must Be Made Saturday

Looking worried and scared Michael W. Coffey, a member of Ruef's boodle board of supervisors, stood up in Judge Dunne's court yesterday afternoon and was arraigned on three charges of accepting bribes.

"There is no objection to the matter going over to Saturday," Judge Dunne said to Bull, who wanted to understand that whatever motions are to be submitted preliminary to the defendant being called upon to plead must be submitted at that time.

"No attempt to delay the case will be made in behalf of the defendant," Bull answered.

Assistant District Attorney Ferrari handed to Coffey a copy of all the testimony taken before the grand jury in connection with the indictment of Coffey.

The crimes charged in the indictments are: Accepting \$4,000 from Ruef, Gallagher and Ford in the United Railroads matter; accepting \$5,500 from A. K. Dewler, in Ruef and Gallagher in the Home telephone company matter; accepting \$750 from Gallagher, Ruef and Drum in the gas company matter.

Bull was not informed which indictment will be tried first, but it is understood that it will be the United Railroads case.

The arraignment proceedings were very short and formal. One indictment was read to the defendant, who was his true name. By consent the reading of the other two indictments was dispensed with.

Articles of incorporation of the Oakland and Alameda railroad, a corporation to construct a line estimated at 150 miles in length from Oakland to the city of Alameda, was filed in the county clerk yesterday.

Mitchell has paid up \$25,300 for 293 shares, and each of the other directors \$100 for a single share.

ATTORNEY RUFFLES COINS

Judge Dunne Scores William C. Crittenden for Concealing Evidence

Council for Shinto Priest Provokes Outburst by Offering to Locate Property

Something like a sensation terminated the first day's proceedings in the trial in Judge Dunne's court of Shusaku Sudo, the Japanese Shinto priest charged with the embezzlement of about \$5,000 worth of valuable oriental curios, including rare paintings and porcelain.

"Gentlemen of the jury, we will show you where these goods are and where they have been since last July."

Prosecutor Ferrari was on his feet in an instant protesting that he was intensely surprised to hear that the defendant with the aid of his attorney had been hiding evidence material in the trial of a criminal action.

ORDER TO DELIVER GOODS
"The officers of the law have searched every nook and corner of the city for these goods, but have been unable to find them," said Ferrari. "I am surprised, at any reputable citizen, let alone an attorney at law, should assist in the concealment from the police and the court of the articles alleged to be the property of the defendant."

Judge Dunne, having dismissed the jury until tomorrow morning, lectured Crittenden upon his conduct, telling him that in his opinion he had not had serious a matter it was to conceal evidence from the court.

"The court has been trifled with," said the judge, "and Mr. Crittenden has failed in his duty in not notifying the police or the district attorney of the whereabouts of the property."

The judge ordered Crittenden to deliver the goods into the hands of the police, and this Crittenden said he would do.

DEPENDANT CLAIMS PROPERTY
Crittenden explained that he had no intention of misleading the court, and said that in his opinion he had a right to the goods because they belonged to him and he was innocent of the charge of embezzlement.

The charge against Sudo arises out of transactions following the importation of the art goods from Japan. Shihata advanced \$1,500 to pay the duty. The goods were placed in his custody, but Sudo is accused of having wrongfully obtained them from him by stating he wished to exhibit them for sale and of having failed to return them.

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Gossip of Railwaymen

"A special providence looks after Standard oil people," said Heinrich Petrus Anewalt yesterday, "and what is the use of common people like us backing them? Why, I tell you, a railroadman isn't in it with them, and the best thing a transportation man can do is to let them have them—the lamb at once, without attempting anything."

"I want to give you a case in point. One of my best friends in town is S. G. Casad, traffic manager of the Standard oil people, who were together. We tossed who should pay the car fare from the ferry. Casad lost.

"Come to the front of the car," he said, "it is easier to get off."

"We found it was easy to get off for him. The conductor began to collect fares at the end of the car, and before he could reach us Casad was at his destination, and slipped off the car with you pay." He beat the United Railroad, and a nickel and we had to pay our fares.

"Now can you beat that? If a railroadman had to pay, his destination would have been at the beach. But everything plays into the hands of the Standard oil people."

Owing to this being the slack season for travel to Sausalito, the railroad company will take its ferry boat Cazadero out of commission and give it a thorough overhauling. New machinery will be put in, the interior cabins will be refurbished and it will made over as if new. When the Cazadero is put back on the run it will be the turn of the Donahue, and the latter will be thoroughly gone over and practically made a new boat. In order to accomplish this the Northwestern Pacific will on the Sausalito run operate boats every 40 minutes, instead of 30 minutes, as at present, commencing at 10 o'clock. With a 40 minute service the travel can be cared for easily with two boats, but it requires the services of three boats to keep the 30 minute schedule.

It is said that all three boats will be spick and span in time for the beginning of the heavy summer season travel.

Thomas Love has been appointed joint agent of the Santa Fe and the Northwestern Pacific at the ferry building and beginning yesterday tickets were sold from the joint office. The new arrangement has been brought about for the convenience of the public, as under the old method of divided offices travelers were inconvenienced in finding their baggage to check.

The fortnightly bulletins of the American Railway association shows a further large increase in the number of idle cars. There was an increase of 15,000 boxcars and 20,779 coal and gondola cars, making a total increase of 45,779. The increase brought the total surplus up to 232,227, the highest figure since August 19, and more than double the number reported in the bulletin of last year.

The Burlington, it is said, in order to connect up its lines in Wyoming and establish a direct line to the north-west, will build 300 miles of new road in that territory. This road, it is asserted again, is preparing to build from Guernsey, in the southeastern part of Wyoming, to the Big Horn basin. Burlington officials are credited with a plan to have a water level line from Lincoln, Neb., to Yellowstone park. The proposed extension in Wyoming will be part of this line. The road will follow the North Platte river most of the distance. When the line from Lincoln is completed the Hill roads will have a low grade route from St. Louis to the northwest. The Burlington will have also a new connection south with the Northern Pacific. A branch will be built either from Coburn, Mont., on the Burlington, to Billings, Mont., on the Northern Pacific, or an extension will be built from Scribner, Mont., on the Burlington, to Laurel, Mont., on the Northern Pacific. This extension will be for the purpose of shortening the distance from Denver to the northwest.

H. J. Snyder of the Mexican Central has left for the south on a business trip.

J. H. Wallace, who was for many years with the engineers' department of the Southern Pacific, has returned from a trip to Europe.
