MISGUIDED PLUNGES ARE FREQUENT AT EMERYVILLE

Charlie Ellison Gives Bookies a Scare by Backing His Horse, J. C. Core

The local race going public displayed poorer judgment yesterday in weighing the chances of prospective winners at Emeryville than upon any previous occasion this season, and the consequences were laid against the horses that finished first in every race. Hal at 2, Oseola at 11 and The Peer at 6 made up a quintet of winners at lucrative prices, and the remaining race went to the favored favorite, Hines, with the exception of Oseola all of the successful outsiders drifted at comparatively short odds, but drifted far back to the front in the last race. Plungers marked the decision of virtually every race, among the supposed good things that went wrong being Bolman, Minnie, Minto, Cor Tennessee Boy, Cambysses, Lucky Mate and Little Jane. Smart money forced down the odds on Hal at 2 and on Oseola at 11 and 12, and only one of them that even succeeded in finishing within the money.

GIVES BOOKIES A SCARE

The biggest scare that the book makers got during the Emeryville race was when Charlie Ellison scattered a big commission over the ring on his horse, J. C. Core, whose previous performance had been anything but brilliant. So persistently did Ellison hammer away at the ring that Core's odds dropped from 10 down to 2 and the bookies who accepted Ellison's coin had visions of a terrific scorching over the head of the stretch, and their relief may be imagined when Lens and Minto, closing with great resolution, overtook the leader at the end of the race. The finish of the race was marked by considerable crowding and confusion, and the bookies who had bet against Lens, but the judges did not deem the interference sufficiently serious to warrant disqualification. Lens had been installed favorite the previous time out, but had performed poorly, and this was the first occasion upon which Ellison's horse had run poorly the previous times out.

While Louis Streuber, the favorite, was being judiciously decided to back away, but Jockey Mentry was taking his time with Hal, and catching up with the leader at the end of the race. The officials were inclined to attribute the reversal to changing track conditions and allowed them to pass without disciplinary action.

In the fifth The Peer easily reversed the result of his previous meeting with Streubler. The latter was a short priced favorite and three in the stretch on the rail after having entered the stretch with a substantial lead, observed in the stretch by the favorite, Boy.
