Despots, Welcomed Treaty of Washington, but Mischief Makers Gain Strength

(Copyright 1909 by Tribune company, Chicago.) Central America has no volcano as dangerous as its political volcano, boiling all the time and likely to erupt any day with consequences which will demand our attention.

With the exception of Costa Rica, which makes the fifth national unit, Central America is poorer today than in 1816 on its secession from Spain.

At that time a single republic, the Central American federation, was formed. Disintegration was due to the ambition of warring leaders, each of whom would create a despotism for himself.

Every one of these petty principalities has more trade with half a dozen foreign nations than with any of its neighbors. Population is scanty on the borders, where brigand depredations and revolutionary excesses are most common.

Everybody knew that Guatemala and Salvador (which is a political vassal of Cabrera's) would take one side before the court, while Zelaya would take the side of his political vassal, Honduras.

When I was in San Jose the Costa Ricans, having discounted the decision, were principally interested in persuading Mr. Carnegie—and he later consented—to give \$100,000 to build a peace palace at Cartago to house the tribunal.

Everybody knew that if damages had been awarded Cabrera never would have liquidated unless an American man of war passed the word from a Guatemalan harbor, and there you have the weakness of the Central American court.

Later, in 1907, they met at San Jose, Costa Rica, in conference and further bound themselves to good behavior.

Zelaya of Nicaragua refused to join the conference. The company of Corinto, made in 1902, was still binding, he said, and he, a satiny exception, had strictly adhered to its provisions.

Then Zelaya and Figueroa, president of Salvador, made a treaty of "good will and amity" at Anapais, Honduras, for public purposes—that is, for the ears of the United States. Privately, they agreed to make a revolution in Honduras and put Sierra, whom they could control, in office as president.

WASHINGTON INEFFECTIVE In the autumn of the same year, 1907, Nicaraguan troops invaded Honduras, captured Tegucigalpa, drove President Bonilla into exile and made Davilla, who is controlled by Zelaya, president.

Then Secretary Root conceived the idea of another compact of Corinto, this time under the direction of the United States public minister to Cartago, in Costa Rica, which established at Cartago, in Costa Rica, the most forward step in international arbitration yet taken.

It was a document worthy of the enlightened legal mind of our secretary of state, and the Central American court of justice, which had been established at Cartago, in Costa Rica, was organized.

Where they were not concerned with the expenses every despot in Central America welcomed the treaty of Washington, excepting, of course, Honduras, which did not need to care. With all elections a farce, the only way to put a dictator out of office is by a revolution.

So Zelaya and Cabrera are more firmly established in power than ever to break their way on the prosperity of the people with their cutthroat soldiers. These two men are the mischief makers of Central America.



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PLAN IS OUTLINED FOR PERIODIC TIMBER CUT

Forest Service Proposes to Improve Monterey Reservation

To improve the present stand of trees and allow a substantial periodic cut of timber the United States forest service, at the request of the war department, has outlined a plan for the management of 125 acres of timbered land on the Monterey Presidio military reservation.

The plan is to cut a certain amount of timber at once, to make another cut at the end of 10 years, and still another in 20 years.

Contending that redwood sprouts growing from stumps of older trees are among the most rapid growing of native trees, undeserving of its reputation as a slow grower, the United States forest service will exhibit sections of a young redwood sprout at the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific exposition at Seattle this summer.
