3 IN AUTO THURSDAY IN CAR COLLISION

Father and Two Sons Hurled Out of Machine and Fatality May Result

OAKLAND, April 21.—Cecil Ellis, 6 years old, was seriously if not fatally injured; his brother Elmer, a year younger, was cut and bruised, and C. R. Ellis, his father, an engineer, living at San Pablo, was also injured in a collision this afternoon between a San Pablo automobile and an automobile, driven by Ellis, in which his children were also riding. The accident occurred in San Pablo avenue, near Forty-fifth street, just after Ellis had backed his machine out of a garage, when he had stopped to have it refueled. The impact demolished the runabout and hurled the driver and the boys, who were in a rear seat, to the street. Sheriff Barnett, who was passing, helped to clear the wreck and took the Ellises to the receiving hospital in an automobile. Neither of the injured persons seemed to be seriously hurt at the outset of the examination. But serious symptoms developed later in Cecil Ellis' case, a severe concussion appearing to have been caused by a fracture of the skull at the base of the brain. Both children were held for observation. As soon as Ellis had recovered from the temporary stunning he sustained he went at once to San Pablo to inform his wife of the accident. Ellis said that when the boys he had driven to Oakland and had left the machine at a garage at Fortieth street and San Pablo avenue to be repaired. This afternoon he started home. At Forty-fifth street, while driving north in the avenue, he started to turn out of the way of a team going the same direction as he was driving. Watching the approach of a southbound car, Ellis' attention was ahead and he did not see the northbound car behind him. He shot directly across the track and was struck before the motorman could avert a collision. The force of the blow was sufficient to hurl the three occupants of the machine far into the street and saving them from being ground in the wreck of the automobile.

EXPLAINS NEW THEORY OF THE STELLAR SYSTEM

Naval Observatory Director Addresses University Students

Berkeley, April 21.—A new theory of the formation of the solar system, advanced some months ago by Prof. T. J. See, director of the naval observatory at Mare Island, was explained to the students of the university yesterday afternoon. Professor See explained that the Laplace theory that the heavenly bodies were thrown off by the sun had been displaced by a later theory that the union of streams of cosmic dust which were mutually attracted one to another, were buried into space and, upon the hardening of their central portions, formed the new heavenly bodies. This was the so-called spiral nebulae theory, he said.
