

WOMAN, WITH CHILD IN ARMS, STRUCK BY MACHINE IN MARKET STREET

Woman, With Child in Arms, Struck by Machine in Market Street

Life of Infant Crushed Out and Chauffeur Is Jailed for Manslaughter

Bewildered by cries of warning uttered by horrified bystanders who saw the impending danger, Mrs. Godfrey Uecker, carrying her 2 year old son Arthur in her arms, ran directly in front of a fast moving automobile in Market street yesterday morning, and as a result the child was almost instantly killed and the mother is now prostrated with grief as well as being in danger of death because of her own injuries.

WOMAN BECOMES CONFUSED

Mrs. Uecker, who lived with her husband at 298 Richmond avenue, left the sidewalk in Market street near Sixth, intending to reach a safety station to board an electric car. When in the middle of the street she saw the automobile and became confused. She started to run back toward the sidewalk, and as she did this the driver of the automobile, Fred Brown, who works of E. G. Stoddard at 911 Golden Gate avenue, guided his car away from the woman. Mrs. Uecker in her excitement turned around and ran toward the north side of Market street.

BABY DIES IN AUTO

Mrs. Uecker and her unconscious baby were taken to the central emergency hospital in the automobile which had struck them. Despite the great speed at which Brown drove his machine to the hospital, death won the race and life was gone from the baby's body when the automobile entered the hospital yard.

Fall Fractures Skull

In attempting to regain his hat, which had been blown from his head, he was riding on a Mission street car yesterday afternoon, Edward Kennedy, a recent arrival from Ireland, fell to the street and sustained a fractured skull, which is expected to result in his death.

TRAINING REEDED FOR PRISON WORK

President Wheeler Criticises Condition of the Penal Institutions

Talks to Club Women About Advantages of the New "University Idea"

"Our state prisons are in terrible condition here, because they are in the hands of untrained men who have not learned their subject," said President Benjamin Ide Wheeler of the University of California in an address given before the members of the California club and their guests on "The New University Idea."

President Wheeler told fully of the ramifications of the university idea as maintained by the state of California, and gave many interesting details as to the schools and stations in connection with the university.

The difference, he held, between the old and the new idea was in the fact that formerly things were taught as masses of facts, but it was now the plan to teach students how to find out things for themselves and to engage in research work.

In closing he said that the greatest of all the many great things done for this state by the pioneers was the founding of the University of California, and that this institution should be the thing of all others which Californians should be proud.


