

"BOOSTERS" ENJOY ENTERTAINMENT DAY

Monterey and Pacific Grove Commercial Bodies Take Guests Sight Seeing Every County in State Represented in Movement to Conserve Natural Resources

DEL MONTE, May 9.—The entertainment day for the delegates to the eleventh semiannual meeting of the counties committee of the California Promotion committee. As guests of the Monterey chamber of commerce and the Pacific Grove board of trade, the "boosters," their wives and daughters went on a sight seeing excursion in Monterey and vicinity and were treated at noon to a mussel bake at Pacific Grove. Automobiles were provided for the visitors, and numerous parties took a spin around the 17 mile drive and visited the old San Carlos mission and other historic points. Most of the delegates returned to their homes on this evening's train. Much that will inure to the benefit of the state at large was accomplished during the deliberations of the counties committee. Especially gratifying to its members was the interest shown by the national government in the efforts being made for the conservation of California's natural resources, no less than three representatives of federal departments in Washington being present to give expert advice and bespeak the support of the national administration in the conservation movement.

Another gratifying result of the efforts of the promotion committee to date is the increasing tendency throughout the state to give aid to the "boosting" movement through the formation of local commercial bodies and their affiliation with the parent organization. Sixty-three such organizations, representing every county in the state, sent delegates to yesterday's meeting.

POT OF GOLD BURIED DURING WAR IS SOUGHT

Money Believed to Have Been Hidden on Church Site CINCINNATI, May 9.—The excavation for the building of the St. Francis church in Dayton, Ky., a suburb, is being watched by many who believe that a pot of gold was buried under that site after the raid of General John Hunt Morgan and his band of confederates near the close of the civil war. The property belonged to the late Matthew McArthur, a noted southern sympathizer. There was a subterranean passage leading from the house, and it is here, the passage having long since been filled up, that the treasure is supposed to be. The money was left, it is said, by a confederate named Caldwell, who had been sent north to pay the troops of General Morgan, then in this vicinity. He stopped at the McArthur residence and his presence being disclosed, he secreted the gold, said to amount to several thousand dollars, and escaped, intending to join General Morgan, but the latter was killed in Tennessee about that time.

NEW LAGUNA HONDA SCHOOL DEDICATED

Crowd of 1,500 Jams Building During Exercises by Leaders Standing room was at a premium yesterday afternoon at the new Laguna Honda school, Seventh avenue and J street, during the dedicatory exercises, which were held under the auspices of the Sunset district improvement club. At least 1,500 persons attended and it was a happy throng of children and parents who realized that they now have a class A school building in the Sunset district. School directors Thomas E. Hayden and Joseph O'Conner and Superintendent of Schools A. Roncovieri addressed the gathering on the significance of the new building and the importance of the education of the children of the neighborhood. PLEA FOR MORE PLAY Director Hayden in his address advised the parents to give the growing students more time for recreation, maintaining that recreation acted as a stimulant to study and to the progress of the student. He turned the school over to the residents of the district, expressing the hope that every parent and child would take advantage of the privilege of free education. Supervisor Ralph McLeran made a few remarks in which he told of the work that had been accomplished since the school bond issue was passed and some of the future plans for new schools. Julius Frankel, a graduate of the Laguna Honda school, who is now well past 50 years of age, spoke to the citizens present and advised them to remain with their studies and apply themselves to their work.

Sketch Presented at Orpheum Shows Wall Street Wonder Changed by a Vision Stoneman, Whose Heart Had Turned to Metal, Becomes Good and Charitable

By WALTER ANTHONY The best show that the Orpheum has presented since it went downtown and deserted Fillmore street was lit up yesterday by the new Orpheum footlights. If ever you have said anything against vaudeville and its frivolous appeal, by all means see "His Phantom Sweetheart." Frederick Allen and a slender company play the sketch, which is not a sketch after all, but a frank bit of real sentiment and given with all the unreality of many soliloquies and honest breaking of dramatic laws. It tells a story, though, that touches as genuinely as the clasp of the hand of a little girl. STORY OF WALL STREET WONDER John Stoneman is a wall street wonder. He's worth so much money that my typewriter hasn't figures enough to transcribe the total. He is old and pitiless and as friendless as he is avaricious. His heart has turned to metal and he sits in his apartments and raises the price of coal; refuses time to men who owe him money, and crushes the financial life of his victims. Then he dozes and dreams. His sweetheart appears in the vision. She saved for well to when he went to the war 40 years before. (It's very obvious, you see.) Now she comes to him again and reminds him of the friends of his boyhood; of the days that are gone. She tells him how she used to love him because he was "square" and played his games honestly. DREAM LEADS TO REFORM All this seems stupid to repeat, but the sketch is not stupid to hear. Of course he wakes up. That, indeed, is the pity of dreaming, and then he reforms. He gives his workmen what they earn, pays his respects to his snubbed and discarded friends, gives his victims time to pay their margins, lowers the price of coal and—if the play had been written in San Francisco—he would, undoubtedly, put in honky gas meters. Frederick Allen as the Stoneman does some naturalistic acting. He is clever and convincing. Miss Bertha Van Norman as the vision makes a demure and pretty miss. The sketch is well staged. PAGE AT HEAD OF BILL Up at the head of the bill comes Francis-Albions and his page in one of the best acts that the Orpheum has seen. It is a combination of music, juggling and athletics, and the two performers are splendid in every category. The "William Tell" overture, played on a xylophone, was one of the best things on the bill. The Russel brothers, assisted by Flora Bonfanti Russel, provide an amusing number, and the Normans in a juggling act give a clean performance and a perfect one. Their Indian club work will be remembered as the best seen here in many months. Hawthorne and Bert, Miss Angela Dolores in "Cupid at Home," La Valera in Spanish dances, and the Melnotte twins and Clay Smith in tippy nonsense complete the bill. "Piif, Paif, Pouif" Revival "Piif, Paif, Pouif" will be given, it is promised, an elaborate revival, tonight at the Princess theater. The cast will include May Boley, Fred Mace, Helen Darling, Zoe Barnett, Fred Ross, Ethel de Prae Houston and James Stevenson, besides the Princess beauty chorus.

WELL KNOWN ENGINEER DIES ON TRIP TO MEXICO
