**REFUSES TO DRINK AND BULLETS FLY**

**Rancher Wants His Bibulous Companion Arrested for Attempt to Commit Murder**

RED BLUFF, June 21.—Henry Stroing of the Dibble creek section has filed an affidavit against David West of the same neighborhood, charging him with attempt to commit murder.  
According to the story told today by Stroing when he came for the warrant, he and West were driving home in separate buggies one night last week, when West offered him a drink from a demijohn of whisky. He refused. West later offered him another drink and he again refused.  
He says that after the third refusal West began abusing him and that he whipped up his horse to get away from West. The latter then fired three shots at him from a rifle which he carried, according to the story told by Stroing.

**ATTEMPT TO MURDER SACRAMENTO SALOONMAN**

**Four Shots Are Fired Through Bedroom Window**

SACRAMENTO, June 21.—An attempt to assassinate William Welch, a prominent saloonman of this city, was made last night, when four shots were fired through a window into Welch's former bedroom.  
As the shots were fired from one side of the house into the bedroom and two from the opposite side, the intention of the assassin was to shoot Welch by chance the bed on which Welch was sleeping.  
Welch had moved his sleeping apartments to another part of the house and so escaped.

**DIES WHILE ON HER WAY TO CHURCH SERVICE**

**Sad Death of Pioneer Resident of Napa**

NAPA, June 21.—Napa lodge No. 18, I. O. O. F., Ivy Rebekah lodge and Napa Canton held impressive ceremonies at the Baptist church in this city last night.  
As the lodges were proceeding to the church, Mrs. J. Jaekle, a prominent member of the Rebekahs, fell to the ground, stricken with an attack of heart trouble. She died a few minutes afterward. She was 50 years of age and was a pioneer of this city. She leaves a husband and several children, including Mrs. C. Mansfield and Miss Susie Knief of San Francisco and sons residing in Napa.  
The funeral will be held under the auspices of Ivy Rebekah lodge in this city.

**The Bride Shower**  
The Bride Shower—If one is invited to a shower and is unable to go, it is nice, but not necessary, to send a gift. As a rule only those sufficiently interested in the bride to be anxious to give her something are invited, so this question seldom arises. The gifts may be taken to the house by the guests themselves or sent in advance. Usually the bride is invited to give her guests a gift. In that case the hostess usually warns her guests, lest they let the cat out of the bag, a clever pretext will often keep a bride from suspecting its object when she is invited to a tea or luncheon at a date suspiciously near her wedding day. The bright hostess invited a girl who had newly come to town and told the bride to be that the tea was for the purpose of introducing this new-comer.  
Showers, nowadays, may be of varying character. Originally the function was always a linen shower. Then came the household shower, and nowadays a girl may be "showered" with any class of article that she can use either for her personal adornment or for the furnishing of beautifying her house. Vases, books, stockings, tinware, bags of all kinds, kitchen furnishings or china, any of these may be the special class of article with which the bride's friends are asked to present her.  
It is very difficult to keep the secret from the bride up to the time of the presentation of the gifts. In these days, when showers are so very common, if a bride is invited to a shower or an afternoon tea, given by one of her most intimate friends in the week just preceding her wedding, and pervading the gathering is that air of mystery which seems impossible to finish, it is not unnatural that she should suspect that something is up. "You can't keep a tin shower secret," said one little bride who was always rattles and rattle. The shower may be accompanied by either a luncheon or a tea, according to the hostess' desires and facilities for entertaining. The tea is naturally the more common.  
Showers are essentially feminine affairs. Not even the groom to be received in invitation, though, if he is known the character of the occasion and is inclined to step in and assist his fiancée to carry home the donations of her friends he is permitted to do so.  
To present the bride with the gifts in some particularly novel, dramatic or dainty fashion is the natural desire of every shower hostess. Here are a few of the ways in which the deed can be done or has been done by clever hostesses.  
At a shower given in June the hostess entertained upon her piazza. The guests were all assembled before the bride to be arrived. Her invitation had been for a later hour than those of the rest of the guests, in order to accomplish this. The victim of the shower was promptly led up to a window that opened from the living room. Out of this window trailed all sorts of strings. To the other end of the strings, within the living room, were attached the gifts. The bride was instructed to pull the strings, one by one, and see what she got. The result was very amusing. The occasion was a household shower and, according to the description of one guest, "sometimes she pulled out a cake spoon and sometimes dragged forth a clothes horse."  
Where the guests at a shower are all very intimate friends of the bride the occasion is sometimes turned into a sewing bee. If it is a linen shower, perhaps the girls will each bring one of the beautiful Japanese dollies that are so popular and spend the afternoon embroidering the bride's initial upon each piece. The same thing may be done to a set of towels. One hostess supplied a dozen napkins, which she required her guests to hem, and still another had a supply of dusters, dish towels and dish towels, which were to be hemmed.

**LADYBUGS LOOSE AND THE APHIS ARE DOOMED**

**Shade Trees of Sacramento Are Safe Once More**

SACRAMENTO, June 21.—The aphis which have destroyed the foliage on the elm and other shade trees of Sacramento are doomed. The ladybugs have been turned loose and County Horticultural Commissioner George Cutter says it will be a few days until the little pests are all eaten up by the ladybugs.

The little pests eat the leaves and cause the trees to bleed, the sap dropping on the sidewalks causing them to turn black. Cutter says there is no longer any cause for worry, however. The ladybugs will do away with them.

**LODGE TREASURER IS SENTENCED FOR CRIME**

**Admits Theft of \$400 and Is Given Five Years**  
FRESNO, June 21.—Charles G. Hayward, former treasurer of Orange lodge of Odd Fellows of Centerville, this county, was this morning sentenced by Judge Austin to five years' imprisonment in San Quentin.  
He had entered a plea of guilty to embezzlement of lodge funds amounting to \$400.  
Hayward is a man of family and was highly respected until his crime was discovered.

**JAPANESE FIEND IS SENTENCED TO 20 YEARS**

**Outraged Woman While Husband Was Bound**  
FRESNO, June 21.—G. Yasuda, a Japanese fiend who several weeks ago at Fowler outraged a woman of his own nationality after tying her husband hand and foot and allowing him to witness the crime, was this morning sentenced by Judge Austin to spend 20 years in San Quentin.  
Yasuda three days ago entered a plea of guilty to the crime.  
After his arrest by the officers near the scene of his crime Yasuda expressed his desire to go to prison and confessed his crime.

**COAST BRIEVES**

**BRINGS \$500,000 GOLD DUST**—Seattle, June 21.—The steamer Victoria, the first ship of the season from Nome, arrived this morning with \$500,000 in gold dust and a small party of miners.  
**DIES OF STARVATION**—Victoria, B. C., June 21.—The finding of the body of J. C. Randolph, the settler at Shawigan, who disappeared three weeks ago in the woods, showed that the missing man perished of starvation while lost.  
**IMMENSE WHEAT CROP**—Seattle, June 21.—S. C. Armstrong, the newly appointed state grain inspector, who has taken office, today made the statement that the Washington wheat crop this year would be not less than 60,000,000 bushels and may go as high as 80,000,000 bushels. This is about 10,000,000 bushels more than the 1908 crop.  
**SUFFOCATED BY SMOKE**—Santa Monica, June 21.—De la Torre Alta, an aged man living here, was found today smothered to death as a result of a fire in his home last night. He was found on the threshold of a rear door, which was barred and locked. He had extinguished the fire with his coat, burning his hands in the effort, but had been smothered by the smoke.  
**WILL PRESENT VAULT**—Suisun, June 21.—Mrs. Jane Stewart, a wealthy resident of Berkeley, but who, with her husband, the late Frank Stewart, made her home here for many years, is to present the Dickson of Oakland with a fine receiving vault to be erected in the member of the local Masonic body during his lifetime.  
**GOES TO CLAIM BRIDE**—Vallejo, June 21.—Witherstone, son of Congressman Witherstone of Tennessee and holding one of the leading positions under the federal government at the local yard, left for Seattle yesterday to claim as his bride Miss Dickson of Oakland. The wedding is the culmination of a meeting during the entertainment of the best celebration in San Francisco last year, while Miss Dickson was visiting on the coast.

**BODY OF MURDERED MAN IN THE RIVER**

**Fishermen Find the Corpse of P. Weiser, an Unknown German**

[Special Dispatch to The Call]  
DELTA, June 21.—The finding of the body of P. Weiser, a German, a mile and a half below town on the river bank, brings to light a murder of several days ago in which robbery was the probable motive.  
The body was found by Modesto Bonifall and James McCourt while fishing. They notified Coroner Houston, who has begun an investigation.  
Two gashes in the skull and a slit in his pockets showed the manner in which the man had been murdered and the probable motive. He was not known here. It is probable from the condition of the body that he was slain several days ago.

**EIGHTY THOUSAND ACRES ARE INVOLVED**

**Attorney General to Bring Test Case to Settle Controversy**  
SACRAMENTO, June 21.—The possession of 80,000 acres of land, valued at \$300,000, will be involved in a test case to be brought by Attorney General Knowlton to settle a controversy arising over the application of the new land laws. The test case will be made in the Hyde contest, in which 16 applications for land were canceled by the process of the new law.  
In the Hyde case the applications have been approved, by which the applicants were to receive scrip for their lands to be taken as they saw fit, selecting government lands. By the new law this practice has been nullified and the lands are first put up at public sale to determine their value before they are exchanged by the government.  
Land Attorney Lake and his clients as well as Hyde insist that the applications were made and should have been filed and approved. The state holds that the new law affects the applications in both instances, and will fight the matter out in the courts.

**WESTERN PACIFIC RUSHING ITS WORK IN SACRAMENTO**

**Depot Will Be Completed Early in August**  
[Special Dispatch to The Call]  
SACRAMENTO, June 21.—The Western Pacific company is showing much activity in Sacramento in preparation for the opening of the line from Oroville to San Francisco. The work on the concrete depot to be erected at Twentieth and J streets is rapidly progressing and Engineer Pierson stated today that he expected to complete the depot by August 15.  
The depots in the towns of Oroville and Marysville will be finished about that time also.  
Engineer Pierson also has a crew of men at work at Front and E streets preparing the site for the freight terminal. When this work is ended the Front street levee will be raised by the company.

**PICNIC RIOTERS WILL BE UP FOR A HEARING**

**Fourteen Peace Disturbers May Have Occasion for Regret**  
MARTINEZ, June 21.—The preliminary trial of the rioters arrested in Martinez two weeks ago at Garibaldi Guard picnic will come up before Justice of the Peace Hayden tomorrow at 10 o'clock.  
In all, 14 rioters have been arrested. Five got out on \$20,000 bonds. The remainder is a former convict.  
It is thought that several will be discharged at the preliminary as having no part in the fight.

**SOLICITOR FOR CALL DROPS DEAD IN FRESNO**

**Harry Fehd in Good Spirits When Stricken**  
FRESNO, June 21.—Harry Fehd, a solicitor for the San Francisco Call, dropped dead in a local restaurant this morning. Fehd had come into the place accompanied by a friend. He seemed in the best of spirits and talked and laughed freely.

**GIVEN TERMS IN THE STATE PRISON**

**Criminals Who Have Been Sentenced to San Quentin for Desperate Crimes**

MARTINEZ, June 21.—Three men were sentenced to San Quentin today by Superior Judge Latimer. Frank Reinhart, who pleaded guilty to the crime of burglary in the second degree, was given a term of three years. He was caught in the act of breaking into a safe in the town of Richmond several months ago. When discovered he started to run, but was felled by a rock from the hand of his pursuer, who had no other weapon.  
George Marisich, who pleaded guilty to the crime of blowing up the home of Uno Hartman, the superintendent of the sugar refinery in Crockett, last February, was sentenced to San Quentin for 50 years. His brother, Lawrence Marisich, was sentenced for 20 years.  
George Barnovich, the partner in the crime of the Marisiches and the real ringleader in the plot, was sentenced to Folsom for life, after being convicted by a jury several weeks ago, but is now in the county jail, having taken an appeal.

**MADE FIRST LAGER BEER IN THE UNITED STATES**

**Death of Albert Ziegele, Pioneer Brewer of America**  
SACRAMENTO, June 21.—Albert Ziegele of Buffalo, N. Y., one of the pioneer brewers of America and the first man to manufacture lager beer in this country, died today at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Herman Graun of this city. He was aged 91 years.

**SACRAMENTO MAN KILLS HIMSELF AT SAN JOSE**

**Gives Illness as the Cause of His Suicide**  
SAN JOSE, June 21.—C. V. Woodsum of Sacramento committed suicide last night in his room at the Menlo lodging house on North First street by shooting himself with a pistol. The body was discovered late this morning. On the bureau was a note giving illness as the cause. He leaves a sister, to whom he willed his property.
