Senator Wright's Index and Explains The New Direct Primary Election Law

Joint Author and Legislative Sponsor Prepares Exposition of the Measure Which Has Revolutionized Political System

SENATOR LEROY A. WRIGHT of San Diego, joint author of and legislative sponsor for the direct primary election law, has completed an index and comprehensive explanation of the law which will be incorporated with the text of the law to be circulated by the secretary of state in accordance with the provisions of a resolution adopted by the legislature. Here is Senator Wright's exposition of the law which bears his name:

Hon. C. F. Curry, Secretary of State, Sacramento, Cal. Dear Sir: At your request, and for the purpose of giving the voter a clear and comprehensive grasp of the California direct primary law, I have prepared the following statement of its provisions, in narrative form, stripped of all legal verbiage.

Under the old convention system party candidates were nominated by the majority vote of assembled delegates. The new direct primary law provides that all party candidates shall be nominated by the voters of the respective political parties. Each party will now choose its delegates to the party convention developed upon the party election, therefore, will hereafter perform the functions of party conventions.

Two methods remain of obtaining a nomination for office. Party nominations must be made in the manner provided under the direct primary law enacted by the state legislature in 1909. Independent nominations may be made by petition signed by 3 per cent of the voters of the district for which the nomination is to be made.

At every party convention for a general election, held in November, will be made a primary election held on the preceding Friday. On that day separate and distinct printed ballots in blocks of 100 for each political party will be provided at all polls. The republican ballot will contain the name of each republican aspirant for nomination who has complied with the provisions of the primary law and who is entitled to receive a ballot. This is also true of the ballots of the democratic, socialist and other parties.

CONDUCTING PRIMARIES The primary election at the polls is conducted in every respect as at a general election. The voter stamps an "X" in the square opposite the name of his choice for a candidate for each office for which nominations are to be made, the same as he may stamp it in the square opposite the name of his choice for a candidate for each office. The primary election officers perform the same functions as the general election officers, and ballots are folded alike as at general elections.

WHAT ASPIRANTS MUST DO In order that an aspirant for a party nomination may have his name printed upon the party ballot and be voted for at the primary election, he must comply with certain requirements. If he is a candidate for an office to be voted for at a November election he must, at least 30 days prior to the election, in August, file nomination papers.

Culinary Notes Frozen Desserts—For freezing desserts at home the freezing mixture is prepared with ice for snowing. A pan of water or of doors over night. With snow a little water must be used to break the melting process. In a family of two, when a frozen dish is prepared, especially in cold weather, it is best to make a pan of sweet dish for both luncheon and dinner, otherwise this form of dessert should be put in a class of dishes reserved for occasional rather than frequent use.

The ice to be used in a freezer must be made nearly as fine as the salt which is to be used with it. In packing a frozen mixture, larger pieces than will dissolve quickly are preferable. For the same reason, very little salt should be mixed with the ice. In packing a frozen dessert that is simply to be kept in this condition, in many freezers there may be frozen quickly and at the same time be light and fluffy in texture, but in general the texture of the dessert is better if it is not frozen too quickly. One measure of salt to three of ice is a fair proportion for mixtures to be frozen in the ordinary freezer. The process will take from five minutes to half an hour, the time depending upon the kind of ingredients used. The make of freezer, Parfaits, being left to freeze without any attention, require to be packed for three or four hours. Use equal measures of ice and

Modern Housekeepers' Exchange Oyster Patties (Mrs. Charles Goetz, Sonora)—One can oysters, two or three eggs (cooked eggs may be used also, but one or two eggs yolks raw will be desirable. For the same reason, use pepper; three tablespoons milk and enough ground bread crumbs to stir thick. Fry in olive oil and butter, or may be prepared in the pan, once and fried slowly. Cut in oblong slices to turn. May be served hot or is very nice for a luncheon, served cold, garnished with lettuce. Turkey Dressing (Mrs. E. J. Hunter, Fresno)—In a large bowl mix bread; add one onion, one clove garlic, one cup celery and six boiled chestnuts minced finely. Parfy fry half a pound of pork sausage in a pan, add one onion, one can of oysters (save mushrooms for gravy). Salt and pepper to taste.
