**AGED PROSPECTOR

Without Food for Two Days  
and on Verge of Collapse  
When Found

MARYSVILLE, July 26.—Without food or drink for two days and nights, clad in scanty attire and suffering from the infirmities of an advanced age, E. McCormick, father of the manager of the Mabel Mertz mine in Sierra county, had a frightful experience in the woods and mountains of Sierra county the latter part of the week. He became lost while prospecting and was unable to find his way home. A searching party covered many square miles and finally when they had about given him up for lost he was discovered on the verge of collapse, famished and exhausted. It will be several days before he is fully recovered.

**WRECKED MACHINE TO

Motorcyclist Turns Wheel Into  
Brick Wall

To avoid hitting the child Mackereel turned toward the curbing, striking the wall with terrific force. He was carried from the scene unconscious, but shortly rallied and limped away.

**BIRTH RATE OF FRANCE  
NOW EXCEEDS DEATH**

Marriages Increase but Divorces  
Grow in Proportion

Unlike the year 1907, when the number of deaths in France was greater than the birth rate, the statistics for the year 1908 show an increase of 46,441 births over deaths. It is principally due to a diminution in the number of deaths that there is this apparent increase in the birth rate.

**PROTEST AGAINST THE  
DYNAMITING OF FISH**

Thousands Have Been Killed by  
Italians and Greeks

MARYSVILLE, July 26.—Numerous complaints are being registered from Sierra City and other points along the middle and north fork of the Yuba river about the large quantities of trout and other fish that are being killed by blasting. Italians and Greeks are the principal offenders, and thousands of fish have been killed, many finding their way down the stream, where they line the banks. The fish commission has been notified, and the people are indignant at the violations of the law.

**SACRAMENTO SCHOOL  
IS DESTROYED BY FIRE**

Defective Wiring Believed to  
Have Started Blaze

SACRAMENTO, July 26.—The Lincoln primary school on Q, Third and Fourth streets, was nearly destroyed by fire this morning. The loss was about \$20,000. The building was completed about two years ago, taking the place of one that had been destroyed by an incendiary. While there is some talk that today's fire was the work of a firebug, the circumstances point to defective electric wiring as the cause.

**MAN DENIED A MEAL,  
SHOOTS CAMP COOK**

Assailant Is Finally Captured  
After Long Chase

GRIDLEY, July 26.—J. Grady, cook at a construction camp near here, was shot today by a man giving his name as Edward Debs, because Grady refused to give him a free meal. Grady gave Debs his supper last evening, but refused to let him have a breakfast today unless he worked for it. Debs drew a revolver and fired at Grady, striking him twice in the arm. He escaped, but was captured at Live Oak.

**SAN JOAQUIN COUNTY

Boudins de volaille blanc—Chicken boudins with white sauce.  
Boudins de veau blanc—Veal boudins with white sauce.  
Bouille a laisee—A celebrated fish stew praised in verse by Thackeray.  
Bouilli, Boiled—Fresh beef, boiled.  
Bouillon—Plain, unclarified beef broth. At present often clarified with white of egg.  
Bouillon, Chicken—Plain chicken broth.  
Bouillon, Clam—Plain clam broth.  
Bouillon, Tomato—Chicken or veal broth and tomato, clarified with egg whites.  
Bouquet garni—A small bunch of savory herbs (parsley, thyme, marjoram, chervil, etc.) tied in a bunch to facilitate the removal, used for flavoring stews, soups, sauces, etc.  
Bourgeois (la)—A term applied to dishes prepared in a simple, homely but wholesome and appetizing manner. Modest home cookery.

**About Honey**

Freezing causes the comb to crack and the honey to break down. When granulated it must be liquefied, save for the few people who like it thus. To do this the honey should be put in a dish, set inside another dish and the water in the lower should not be allowed to boil. A half day's time is necessary for this. Or the honey may be simply set on top of the water reservoir of the stove. The color and flavor are quite sure to be hurt if heated over 160 degrees.  
As honey is apt to be thin even at moderate temperatures, set it in the oven, let it ripen, and grow so thick that it will not spill off from an inverted spoon. Such honey is claimed to be more digestible than any form of sugar. Honey may be given to children in place of butter upon bread, or for dessert with crackers.  
Honey makes a fine sauce for boiled rice, or batter puddings in cups. Honey makes a good second course at luncheon on busy days, in place of any cooked dessert.

**MOSS GROWN FRAUD MAY HAVE PUT AN  
END TO HIS LIFE**

Letter From Spain Telling of  
\$80,000 Hidden Away in  
Suitcase

SACRAMENTO, July 26.—Evidence of the resumption of the Spanish frauds, which found many victims throughout the United States several years ago, became known here today when C. Cloff, a Spanish grocer, received a letter from Spain telling him that the writer, an oldtime friend, is in a bankrupt's prison in Madrid, which is the reason for withholding his name.  
The missive states that if Cloff comes to Spain and furnishes money with which to liberate the prisoner he will receive one-third of \$80,000 hidden in a trust case. Nobody in Spain can be sued with the secret, says the correspondent.  
Cloff thinks it is a fraud, so will not reply.

**ONE ARMED MAN RUNS  
AMUCK ON A RANCH**

Probable Lunatic Is Overpowered  
After Hard Fight

MARYSVILLE, July 26.—J. Debs, a one armed man who is believed to be insane, ran amuck at the Chandon ranch, six miles north of this city, last night, shot Edward Grady through the shoulder and attempted to kill several other men.  
Debs was armed with a revolver and a knife. He was finally overpowered and captured, after which he was lodged in jail at Oroville.  
Grady was not seriously injured.

**PICTURESQUE BRIDGE  
SCENE OF 180 SUICIDES**

Edinburgh Town Council Plans  
to Prevent Tragedies

Edinburgh is noted for its bridges, and by far and away the most picturesque, the Dean bridge, has an unenviable notoriety. It is the favorite place of suicides in the city, and a case which has just occurred brings the total of such tragedies up to 180. The town council of Edinburgh has had the matter under consideration, but up to the present nothing has been done. A great argument for leaving things as they are has been that any tinkering at the parapet would spoil the view. Much is to be said in favor of this contention, especially when it is remembered that all a railing would be to prevent a suicide at that particular spot.—London Globe.

**WHITE LEGHORN HEN IS  
CHAMPION EGG LAYER**

Australian Fowls' Record for  
Twelve Months Was 1,447

The 12 months' egg laying competition, conducted by the state at Roseworthy agricultural college, South Australia, has ended. It was divided into two sections for light and heavy breeds, six hens to lay in each section. The first prize, according to Feathered Life, was won by the Ontario farm white leghorns, which laid 1,447 eggs. Mrs. A. E. Kinnear, who won last year's competition, this time secured the fourth place, with 1,237 eggs. Mrs. Kinnear's record of 1,237 for five hens is a world's record. In heavy breeds, Kappler Brothers' silver wyandottes, with 1,162 eggs, won the first prize.

**OSAGE INDIANS FLEECE  
TWO POKER SHARPS**

Converse in Native Tongue and  
Confide Hands to Each Other

Homer Needles of Muskogee, Okla., brought with him a prize poker story. He declares it to be accurate as to facts.  
"The Osage Indians delight in the gay American game of poker," said Needles. "Often they play for large stakes. This is true immediately after they receive payments from the government. The receipt of the money is a sure indication that the big bucks and the little bucks as well will gather around a blanket—not the green cloth, this time, but the white one known in poker parlance as 'freezout.' They call it by some other name."  
"The 'buyout' runs all the way from \$100 to \$500. Hearing of the large stakes and thinking it would be an excellent opportunity to annex a little of the free and easy Indian money, a couple of fellows from Arkansas City, Kan., drifted down into the Osage nation, arriving there just in time to get in on the big game. The visitors had been told that a few hundred dollars in gold and silver was a heap more fascinating to the Indians than would be certified checks for thousands. So they came loaded down with coin. They expected to hire a special train to carry away their winnings.  
"The game began. The Indians sat stolid of countenance. Now and then a buck would grunt out a few words in his native tongue which would not be understood by the strangers. If they had understood they would have been wiser at least, if not richer. The Indians were telling each other what they held in their hands. Also they were telling each other whenever possible what the strangers were holding. The 'system' enabled all the Indians excepting the one holding the largest hand to drop out. A few minutes of this sort of playing was all that was required in the big game. The visitors never knew how it happened until they were 'put next' by a man who had gone up against the game himself.—Washington Post.
