RIVAL RAILWAYS SEEK SAME RIGHT OF WAY

Harriman in Clash With the Oregon Trunk Road

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 9.—The federal government has intervened in the fight which is going on in the rich Deschutes country between the Harriman interests and Porter Brothers, contractors for the Oregon trunk railway. A restraining order was issued today by Federal District Judge Wolverson, forbidding the Harriman interests from entering upon the southern 60 miles of the Oregon trunk right of way between Madras and the mouth of White creek.

FRAUD CHARGED IN PURCHASE OF STOCK

Union National Bank Refused to Make Delivery on Ground Cashier Was Deceived

OAKLAND, Aug. 9.—Intimating that fraud had been used, officials of the former Union national bank resisted in Judge Ellsworth's court today an attempt by George McBoyle to enforce the delivery of stock valued at \$59,000 purchased for \$11,000. Attorney R. M. Fitzgerald, representing the bank, contended that the alleged sale had been unlawful and that former Cashier C. E. Palmer had been deceived as to the actual value.

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HAIRED 7000 FEET

William McDonald of Oakland Is Terribly Injured at Devil's Slide

CLOVERDALE, Aug. 9.—William McDonald, a deputy assessor of Alameda county, who has been spending his vacation at McRae's hotel, went over a precipice known as the "Devil's slide" yesterday and fell a distance of 700 feet into Sulphur creek, a tributary of the Russian river. He was terribly injured, but was alive when rescued by his assistance.

McDonald's terrible fall was the result of his heroism in trying to save the lives of two companions and a man who were riding with him in a wagon along the Geyserville road. They were John and Mrs. Cooley and a woman whose name has not been ascertained.

WAS ON VACATION TRIP

OAKLAND, Aug. 9.—William McDonald, deputy assessor of Alameda county, who was injured near Cloverdale this morning, lives with his father, William McDonald, a retired business man, at 548 Thirty-second street. He has been in the employ of the county for a number of years, and about three weeks ago he left on his annual vacation. Since then he has been on an outing and hunting trip in Mendocino county.

Dr. F. J. Todd arrived this evening from Sausalito with McDonald and took the injured man to Providence hospital, where the patient lies in a precarious condition, the outcome of which is doubtful. The surgeon said tonight that if the patient survives he will be kept in the hospital for a number of days before he will be permitted to go home.

FAVORS NEW SITE FOR POSTOFFICE

Federal Agent Says Fletter Estate Holds Property at Exorbitant Figure

ALAMEDA, Aug. 9.—Special Agent J. C. Sauter of the department of justice at Washington, who was sent here recently to inspect the sites offered for the proposed federal building for the postoffice, said today that he would recommend the purchase of the Captain R. R. Thompson property in Central avenue adjoining the Alameda national bank reality. Sauter declared that he considered that the price asked for the Augusta Fletter lot at the southeast corner of Oak street and Santa Clara avenue, \$30,000, was exorbitant, as the land is assessed for but \$2,500.

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RULES "NEAR BEER" BREAKS THE LAW

Berkeley Council Puts Lid on Sale of College Town Beverage

BERKELEY, Aug. 9.—The screws of the prohibition lid over this city were given another twist by the authorities today and "near beer" was placed on the ban. This liquor was sold as a substitute for the real beverage until last week, when federal revenue inspectors swooped down on the local vendors and, after warning a number, placed Al Zeimer of Center street under arrest for refusing to pay a license of \$29 and an additional \$10 for failure to secure the license July 1.

The city council this morning, in ruling against "near beer," did not pass an ordinance to that effect, but agreed to construe the present city ordinance No. 480-A, prohibiting the sale of alcoholic liquors, as including all liquors which contain alcohol whether the drink is intoxicating or not.

GREEK FLAG LOWERED ON ISLAND OF CRETE

Protests Are Made by the Four Protecting Powers

CANEA, Island of Crete, Aug. 9.—The Greek flag which was run up over the fortress and the Cretan military barracks on July 27, the day after the evacuation of the island by the international troops, was lowered today as a result of the protests of the four protecting powers.

WILL REMAIN NEUTRAL

ATHENS, Aug. 9.—The Greek government today handed to the Turkish minister a formal reply to the porte's note, which asked Greece to express her disapproval of the annexation agitation in Crete and formally to declare that she had no ambitions regarding the island.
