

PLEAD FOR VOTES FOR P. H. MCCARTHY

Ardent Supporters and Candidate Himself Address Ingle-side Union Labor Club

Present Administration Accused of Entering Conspiracy to Lower Wage Scale

Aided by Andrew Gallagher, Michael Casey and half a dozen other leaders of organized labor, P. H. McCarthy pleaded for support last night before the Ingle-side union labor club.

"Times are hard in San Francisco now," McCarthy said, "and the reason for it is the business men long ago discovered. It is because the workmen of the city are not receiving the wages they formerly were granted and because so many of them are and have been out of work."

"If I am elected wages will go back to their past figures. I will make San Francisco the city that Providence city in which decent, hard working and God fearing people will be proud to live."

Andrew Gallagher stated, in a terse address, that he was mounting a public platform for the first time in his life to denounce the present administration, to declare that it had ridden into power on the backs of the people, and to urge the workmen to stand by the union labor ticket throughout.

Michael Casey also attacked the present regime, and pleaded for McCarthy's election. John A. Kelly, a candidate for supervisor; H. M. Alexander, candidate for treasurer; Robert Knowles, "the ice man" candidate for supervisor; and John Sullivan, candidate for police judge, also endorsed McCarthy, and asked for their respective nominations.
