## DAM WILL PREVENT DANGER OF FLOODS

State Engineer Promises to Commence Work on Yuba River Without Delay

MARTSVILLE, Aug. 18.—The state of California will begin at once the building of a dam on the Yuba river, a short distance above this city, for the purpose of diverting the waters of the entire stream from its present channel into the cutoff recently constructed. State Engineer Ellery was here today looking over the ground, and he says that he will take up the work at once, so that by winter the waters will be all going through the new channel. This will eliminate the danger of flood to this city from the Yuba and the Feather river cutoff now in course of construction will take away all danger from that side.

## HIGH VOLTAGE WIRE NEARLY KILLS LINEMAN

Thrown From Telegraph Pole, but Rapidly Recovers

MARYSVILLE, Aug. 18.—Receiving the charge from a high voltage electric wire into his body while making repairs to a line above the sidewalk of the main street at Willows yesterday, Charles Garrouette, a lineman in the employ of the Northern California power company, fell from the top of a telegraph pole. He was unconscious for a few minutes, but slowly, to the astonishment of the friends and spectators, began to show signs of life, and was soon up and around, though not able to work.

## LAD STEALS CHICKENS TO FULFILL CONTRACT

Arrested After Emulating Principles of Frenzied Finance

NEVADA CITY, Aug. 18.—When Hooker Johnson, aged 18, made a contract with a local tamale house recently to furnish chickens he had no visible supply of his own, but he fulfilled his contract. It has just been learned that he stole the chickens, a dozen or more at a time, and a warrant was issued for his arrest. He heard of it and skipped, but was caught at Colfax and will be brought back.

## TAKES CHARGE OF STOCKTON ROAD

Former Mayor Gardner Becomes President of Line to Run to Jenny Lind

STOCKTON, Aug. 18.—M. J. Gardner, former mayor of this city and president of the Gardner lumber company, will in a few days sever his connections with the lumber firm and assume the presidency of the Stockton-Jenny Lind railroad. Gardner is one of the city's most progressive citizens and his connection with the proposed railroad is considered good evidence of the successful outcome of the project. The road is to extend from Stockton to Jenny Lind, Calaveras county, and will tap the richest section of this county. The rights of way have been secured to within a distance of 800 feet of the city, and Gardner will soon apply to the city council for a franchise over certain streets.

## CASHES COMPANIONS' CHECKS AND VANISHES

Hindu Boss of Vineyard Gang Leaves Friends Stranded

MARTSVILLE, Aug. 18.—A Hindu who had charge of a gang of the city workmen working in the grape vineyards at Vina has vanished and left his friends stranded. He took with him \$500 of their wages, and they have appealed to the authorities to assist them in getting their money back. The Hindus applied for their wages at the company's office, and when told that the boss Hindu had cashed their checks they started out to have an understanding with him. He had disappeared. The whole band of Hindus have gone to Red Bluff in hopes of finding him there.

## WIRE TAPPERS CAUSE MINING FIRM TROUBLE

Cut Telephone Leading From Yuba County Plant

MARYSVILLE, Aug. 18.—Wire tappers and wire cutters are at work in Yuba county to the inconvenience of the telephone people and the California Mother Lode mining company, operating a big mine and milling plant at Indiana ranch, east of this city. On three different occasions during the last week some one bent on doing the mining company damage has cut the telephone wire running from the mine to this city. On another occasion during an important transfer of messages the wire was tapped.

## RANCHER'S LIFE SAVED BY POUND OF BUTTER

Taken as Antidote to Ptomaine Poisoning Near Gridley

GRIDLEY, Aug. 18.—Joseph Coheen, a rancher near here, owes his life to a pound of butter. After eating canned beans he fell ill and soon realized he had ptomaine poisoning. No physician was near, but Coheen remembered reading that butter was an antidote, so he ate all he could find in the house, more than a pound. When a physician called later he told Coheen that the butter probably saved his life.

## BARRED FROM TAKING REFEREE APPOINTMENT

Sacramento Attorney Compelled to Give Up Position

SACRAMENTO, Aug. 18.—Attorney A. R. Tabor of this city was recently appointed referee in bankruptcy in this district by United States District Judge de Haven, but now discovers that he is not qualified to serve the office. He has been practicing in government mining and land matters and finds that he would be barred from such if he accepted the referee position, so has given up the new appointment.

## FIERCE FOREST FIRE NEAR GRASS VALLEY

Orchards Damaged, Standing Timber and Cordwood Burn

GRASS VALLEY, Aug. 18.—A fierce forest fire, which for a time threatened several ranches in the Forest Springs district south of this city, broke out today, but was brought under control tonight after the farmers of the section combined in cutting it off. Great damage was inflicted on the young orchards and a considerable tract of valuable timber was destroyed. Much cordwood, piled for transportation, was consumed.

## OLD MOUNT LASSEN EMITS LOUD ROARS

Residents Alarmed by Evidences of Renewed Activity in "Extinct" Volcano

MARYSVILLE, Aug. 18.—Noises like the distant discharge of cannon and rumblings of a distant thunder are being heard in the Mt. Lassen region, and these noises are just now causing considerable anxiety among the residents along the sides and base of the mountain. The mountain is an extinct volcano, but of late years there have been ample evidences of a renewal of life in the region. Hot springs have been discovered, and in one or two instances hot mud has been found oozing from crevices in the sides of the mountain. This year the rumblings have been the only indications of activity in the bowels of the old volcano, but these have been sufficient to cause alarm, and some of the residents of the region are getting ready to scatter at the first outward sign of trouble.

## STRIKE LEADERS FOUND GUILTY OF CONSPIRACY

Japanese Editors and Organizer Convicted in Honolulu

HONOLULU, Aug. 18.—After being out six hours the jury in the case of the four Japanese strike leaders charged with criminal conspiracy brought in a verdict of guilty last night. President Makino of the higher wage association, the organization in charge of the strike of the Japanese laborers on the sugar plantations of the islands; Editor Soga of the Japanese newspaper Jiji, and Assistant Editors Negoro and

Tashaka of the same paper, were charged with criminal conspiracy June 14, when officers with search warrants entered the offices of the Jiji and the higher wage association and found there evidence of what the authorities said was a widespread move on the part of the Japanese strikers to take possession of the government of the territory.

Later the grand jury charged the arrested men with criminal conspiracy to incite riot, violence and injury to the property of the plantations affected by the strike. A futile effort was made to secure the release of the accused leaders through habeas corpus and they were brought to trial July 14.

## WOMAN MAY DIE FROM EFFECT OF BURNS

Alcohol Stove Explodes With Probably Fatal Result

SACRAMENTO, Aug. 18.—Alcohol exploding in a small stove was trying to fill with lighted envelopes Mrs. M. L. Arnold in a mass of flames at the rear of her rooms at 917 H street today and burned her so badly that recovery is doubtful. Mrs. Arnold's flesh from her head to her feet, with the exception of a small portion that was protected by her corset and slippers, was scathed by the fire.
