Cities of Oakland, Alameda and Berkeley Given Special Day of Entertainment

[Special Dispatch to The Call] SAN JOSE, Sept. 25.—The first of the "California Cities" days to be celebrated during the first national pure food and industrial exposition now being held in this city was observed today and the affair aroused much enthusiasm.

Monday will be Santa Cruz and Watsonville day; Tuesday will be devoted to Pacific Grove, Salinas and Gilroy; Wednesday will be given over to San Francisco and north bay cities; Thursday Sacramento and the sister city of the twin valleys, Stockton, will celebrate, and Friday San Mateo, Redwood City and Palo Alto will have 12 hours of frolic.

Delegations from the various cities and towns are expected on their days of honor, for the railroads have made special rates from all points, and special entertainments will be given each day.

Miss Ethel Carlyon of 42 South Third street, San Jose, has been awarded the first prize of \$50 in the art poster contest, in which some forty artists competed.

WALNUT CROP LESS THAN LAST SEASON Growers' Association Meets to Fix Prices for Year

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 25.—The crop of English walnuts of southern California, which includes nearly all the walnuts of that variety produced in this country, is estimated this year at 2,000 tons, or 2,000 tons less than the amount produced last year.

The Walnut Growers' association met today at the chamber of commerce rooms to fix the price for the coming year. Great interest attached to the gathering, and brokers were massed about the door of the convention awaiting the result.

Last year the price for the best grades was fixed at 12 1/2 cents a pound, with the result that a subsequent cut was forced. The new crop is nearly ready for the market.

The growers fixed the price at 11 1/2 cents for first class softshells and 10 cents for second class softshells. Brokers will receive 1 1/2 per cent discount.

CANADIAN FLEET FOR PACIFIC SIDE URGED Official Says Statesmen Believe Crisis Exists

VICTORIA, B. C., Sept. 25.—At a meeting of the board of trade yesterday, William Templeman, minister of mines and inland revenue; Ralph Smith, member for Esquimalt and Nanaimo, and G. H. Bernard, member of parliament for Victoria, announced their support of Esquimalt in the Canadian naval base on the Pacific, where a fleet consisting of a cruiser of the Bristol type and destroyers of the river class will be placed.

Smith said that his interviews with prominent British statesmen and others and information received by him had convinced him beyond doubt that a great crisis existed and that the empire was in danger and he urged the completion of the details of the colonial fleet, which are to be built to assist in the defence of the empire.

WILL DO MISSIONARY WORK AMONG CANADIANS German Evangelical Synod Determines to Extend Its Field

BURLINGTON, Ia., Sept. 25.—The general conference of the German Evangelical synod of the United States, in session here yesterday, decided to extend its missionary work into the Canadian field.

The conference also decided to install English speaking missionaries where a suitable field exists in America and authorized the home missionary board to employ traveling missionaries.

Resolutions strongly favoring parochial schools were adopted.

SURGEONS OF FLEET TO VISIT LEPER COLONY

Cruiser Will Land Medicos at Kalaupapa [Special Correspondence of The Call] HONOLULU, Sept. 18.—The surgeons of the Pacific fleet are to pay a visit to the leper settlement on Molokai, arrangements having been completed for them to embark on one of the cruisers, which will proceed to Kalaupapa and land them. A day will be spent in the settlement and in an inspection of the federal leprosyarium, where it is proposed to carry on a thorough investigation into the leprosy problem. The visit of the fleet surgeons will be under the auspices of the territorial board of health.
