Immigration Inspector Is Instructed to Prosecute Mexican as Anarchist

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 21.—Instructions to proceed with the hearing in the case of L. Gutierrez de Lara, the Mexican liberal and author accused of being an alien and an anarchist, were sent from Washington today to Inspector of Immigration A. C. Ridgeway in this city. No date has been set for the hearing, but this will probably be announced tomorrow.

Efforts of the newly formed De Lara defense league today have an order issued admitting De Lara to bail proved unavailing and the prisoner remains in the city prison. Funds sufficient to secure his liberation are in the hands of the league officers.

CATTLE AND HIDES ARE ADMITTED TO STATES

Treasury Department Finds Disease Eliminated

WASHINGTON, Oct. 21.—Secretary Wilson notified the treasury department today that Great Britain, Ireland, France, Germany, Italy, Spain, and North America, including Mexico, are so far free from contagious or infectious diseases of animals that cattle therefrom may be imported without danger to livestock in the United States, and that hides of neat cattle may be imported from all parts of the world under proper sanitary regulations.

The department accordingly suspended the prohibition in the new tariff law against neat cattle and their hides, providing, however, for the necessary sanitary regulations of the secretary of agriculture as to the cattle and the treasury department as to the hides.

Certificates of disinfection signed by the American consul for the district ports which the hides are shipped will be required upon the entry of all exports from Europe, Africa, Asia and South America.

Prospects in the Caucasus present many opportunities, and enormous beds of coprolites exist in central Russia and in the Dnieper basin, the quantities in the latter being estimated as high as 27,000,000 tons.

The production in the several districts were as follows, in tons: Ural, 8,428; Caucasus, 4,780; Siberia and Kirgizia, 2,418; and other districts, 1,680.

The consumption of copper in Russia in 1908 was as follows: Produced in the empire, 16,478 tons; Imported, 4,857 tons; total, 21,335 tons. The prices of copper in Moscow during 1908 ranged from \$6.75 to \$8.50 per pound of 36 pounds.
