

Little Boxers Hold Attention Fight Fans All Eyes Are Turned on Powell and Frayne, Who Meet Tomorrow Night

The fight fans of San Francisco have temporarily switched their attention from Jeff and his theatrical plans and Johnson and his dares, to the native son lightweights, Jew Powell and Johnny Frayne. These rising young stars of the 24 foot ring will meet tomorrow evening for the first time in the Coliseum to settle their long standing dispute. The bout is carded to go 20 rounds and if the boys fight as they claim they are going to and as their admirers look for them to do, the battle will end in a knockout before the finish is in sight.

Powell is a 10 to 8 choice over the other little fellow who is so confident of being the victor. He has been a very consistent performer and this is the reason why the fans who like to have a bit of excitement on a ring engagement have installed him such a pronounced choice. If they continue to do as they do now, the chances are that the subject will enter the ring as good as 10 to 6.

There is also a lot of praise coming to Frayne for the way he has handled the three lengths behind Mustapha, the Cambridgehire stakes, a handicap of 25 sovereigns each with 500 sovereigns added, for three year olds and upward, distance one mile and a furlong, was won by Christmas Daisy. Mustapha was second and Louis Williams third. Nineteen horses were entered, no less than four being American, including J. R. Keene's Ballot, August Belmont's Priscillian and Charles Carroll's Wheatener. None of these latter secured a place. Christmas Daisy was a rank outsider.

Gallantry was second and Flemington third. Among the 15 starters were August Belmont's Burgman, which finished unplaced.

An all aged selling plate of 102 sovereigns at five furlongs was won by Hackler's Beauty third. August Belmont's Ferule was unplaced. The second year old race of 200 sovereigns for two year olds, five furlongs, was won by Cattail. Mignonne was second and the favorite, the colt H. P. Whitney's Newcastle II and Charles Carroll's Washoe were starters.

The Moulton stakes of 20 sovereigns each with 200 sovereigns added, for two year olds, distance five furlongs, was won by Adria. The favorite, he has in San Francisco. 
