ARMY READY FOR BATTLE FOR NEEDY

Berkeley Charity Workers Numbering Several Hundred Will Collect Funds Wednesday

BERKELEY, Nov. 22.—With an army of several hundred of the society men and women of this city "General" Mrs. C. H. Rieber, commanding the charity workers of the Berkeley charities organization, announced today that all was in readiness for the march of her army on Berkeley Wednesday to collect funds for the needy of this city.

The army will assemble for final instructions in the First Unitarian church tomorrow afternoon at 4:30 o'clock. Each collector will be given a small bank in which the contributions are to be placed and pledges deposited, to be later turned into the charity army headquarters. SURGEONS SUGGEST INFIRMARY PLANS

Committee of Three Tell Board of Requirements of the County Hospital

OAKLAND, Nov. 22.—Salient features to be incorporated in the plans for the proposed new county infirmary were submitted to the board of supervisors today by Dr. W. A. Clark, Dr. O. D. Hamlin and Dr. Daniel Crosby, a committee recently appointed.

Dr. Clark, who, as superintendent of the infirmary for the last 15 years, is thoroughly conversant with the needs of the plant, was assisted by Doctor Hamlin and Doctor Crosby in formulating the requirements of an up to date institution with the poor farm principle subordinated to that of the hospital and infirmary.

The first suggestion was that the buildings be absolutely fireproof and that three stories be the limit in height. Wards will be capable of accommodating 16 beds, and an extra ward will be provided for use when one of the regular wards is fumigated.

The pavilion plan of connected groups of buildings was also advised in order to keep patients out of doors, but under shelter, as much as possible. Wide and deep porticos are asked for. Detached buildings for patients afflicted with tuberculosis and contagious diseases will be an essential feature.

Up to date heating, ventilation and lighting, with provisions for first class operating rooms and surgical wards are included in the suggestions. The configuration of the infirmary grounds will be taken into account in locating the buildings.

Dr. Frank Ainsworth, head of the Southern Pacific model hospital of San Francisco, was first suggested as a member of the committee, but his illness prevented his acting. Doctor Crosby was then chosen.

The board will insert the recommendations of the committee in the report for plans, and architects will be invited to enter into a competition. The grand jury after inspecting the present infirmary.
