FATHER SAVES BABE FROM DEATH

Incident of a Blaze in Roseville That Destroyed Two Buildings in That Town [Special Dispatch to The Call] ROSEVILLE, Nov. 25.—Two fires in Roseville last night and this morning caused a loss of several thousand dollars. The Smith & Stein building next to the Dorris theater burned, following an explosion of an oil lamp.

Hanisch, who occupied a room of the building, was injured falling from a ladder in making his escape. The lively stable of S. M. Hunter, near the depot, also burned. Both buildings were well insured.

DRUNKEN INDIAN IS RESCUED FROM WELL

After Swimming an Hour Is Saved by White Men [Special Dispatch to The Call] ALTURAS, Nov. 25.—Deputy Sheriff A. E. Smith and W. E. Rachford rescued an Indian from drowning in a well on the Neigle ranch yesterday afternoon. The Indian had been to town and started for the reservation in an intoxicated condition. He fell into a 40 foot well on the Neigle ranch. There was about eight feet of water in the well and the Indian had been swimming for an hour or more when discovered by Smith and Rachford.

MELTING OF SNOW IS SWELLING THE RIVERS

J. von Loben Sels, a wealthy down river rancher, the privilege of filing an amended complaint in his suit against the San Francisco savings bank, involving several hundred thousand dollars, Judge Shields has forced the case to trial next Tuesday. Von Loben Sels is suing for \$150,000 payments on a deed of trust and for \$100,000 damages for the refusal of the bank to proceed to sell the ranch, claiming Von Loben Sels had not made payments on money borrowed.

AUTO HURRY CART FOR WASHINGTON

National Capital Force Has Just Received a Franklin Specially Built Car

Is One of the Most Complete of Any in Use in Police Departments of Country

By R. R. L'HOMMEDIEU A police patrol automobile for the police department of Washington, D. C., has recently been delivered by the H. H. Franklin manufacturing company. It is equipped with an air cooled, 18 horsepower engine, has a blue body with red running gear, and seats 10 people inside and two outside.

It has facilities for use as a temporary ambulance, the cushions from the seats along the sides being removable and the hinged seats lifting to give space for stretchers and other paraphernalia. There is a medicine chest under the driver's seat and a compartment for supplies back of the seat, accessible from the inside. There are two brass lanterns, which are instantly detachable when needed. The body is of strong and light construction, and the upper part is entirely incased with a metal grill work. The driver is protected from the weather by a glass front, a mackintosh apron and side curtains.

The motor car is fitted with large pneumatic tires, the use of which is in conformity with the Franklin idea of commercial tire equipment. In their favor it is announced that they are more durable than solid rubber tires, cost less for upkeep and insure easy riding, which also means longer life to the entire automobile.

NEW YORK, Nov. 25.—Prominent automobileists from many parts of the United States will attend the annual meeting of the board of directors of the American automobile association to be held here next Tuesday. Outside of the presence of officers it is expected that important action will be taken concerning the good roads movement of the middle west and that steps will be inaugurated to obtain desired legislation in various states.

A. A. A. to Hold Annual Meeting Excavating for the foundation and basement of the White motor car company's new garage at the northeast corner of Sixth and Main streets, Portland, was begun last week. Work on the superstructure will be under way by November 1 and about 60 days, according to the plans of the architect, the building will be completed and ready for occupancy.

The building is to be a three story and basement structure of reinforced concrete construction, with a duplicate, except as to size, of the White motor car company's San Francisco garage. On the first floor will be the White motor car company's offices and salesrooms. The whole second floor will be a factory for the production of the third floor will be used exclusively as a storeroom for new cars.
