OAKLAND, Dec. 11.—The announcement of the betrothal of Ludwig Huemer of Vienna and Miss Gertrude L. Warnecke was made this evening to the friends of the young couple at a musicale at the Warnecke home in Grove street. The wedding will be celebrated early in the spring. Huemer and his bride will leave for a tour of the Atlantic coast, and will from New York for Vienna, where they will spend two years with the bridegroom's parents before returning to Boston, where they probably will establish their permanent home. Miss Warnecke is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Carl Warnecke. She is an exceedingly pretty girl, and gifted musically, as is her fiancé. The Warnecke family formerly resided in Montreal, where they were well known. Huemer is the son of a prominent family of Vienna. For the last few years he has been engaged in business in San Francisco.

## PIONEER IN THE GLOVE TRADE PASSES AWAY

OAKLAND, Dec. 11.—Frank G. Conklin, who established the first glove manufactory on the Pacific coast, died this week at his home, 1325 Fourth avenue, East Oakland, where he had lived for 25 years. Conklin came to California in 1885 and two years later established the business which became the largest glove factory west of Chicago. He was a member of Brooklyn lodge No. 225, F. & A. M. His wife, a son, Fred F. Conklin, and a daughter, Alice J. Conklin, survive.

## NOT IMPRESSED BY DE LANCEY'S PLEA

### Court Intimates That Motion for a New Trial Will Be Denied

OAKLAND, Dec. 11.—Strong intimation was given today by Judge Brown that he would deny the motion for a new trial made by the attorneys of John S. de Lancey, who was convicted of embezzling \$10,000 from the estate of the late George Hite Cook while he was acting as legal representative of former Public Administrator Gray.

"I feel now that I should deny this motion," said Judge Brown.

A. L. Frick, De Lancey's attorney, had argued for two hours when this statement was made. He submitted more authorities, which Judge Brown consented to examine, and the case was continued until Monday morning for decision and sentence.

De Lancey and his attorneys are not yet sure whether they will appeal from Judge Brown's decision denying them a new trial, if, as is expected, that decision is made Monday. Frick admitted as much today, and asked Judge Brown not to pass sentence immediately upon making his decision as to the new trial, but to give him a chance to have a conference with M. C. Chapman, who is also De Lancey's attorney. Judge Brown consented to this, but the delay will not extend beyond Monday, as that is the last day allowed by law for the passing of sentence.
