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WAR OVER CONTROL OF E-M-F CARS IS CARRIED TO THE COURTS

E-M-F Company Is Seeking to Cancel Its Contract With the Studebaker

Later Declare the Contest Has Not Been Decided and Is Still in the Courts

A merry war in the automobile trade has begun in the east. The E-M-F company has started proceedings to cancel its contract with the Studebaker automobile company.

In an interview yesterday with Chester N. Weaver, general manager of the Studebaker interests in California, Weaver said that the fight by the Studebaker company has just begun.

The following telegram was received by Weaver yesterday from the Studebaker automobile company:



Golf Association Scores the Western Insurgents

NEW YORK, Dec. 28.—The presidents of the Massachusetts, Metropolitan, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, Connecticut and Rhode Island golf associations will meet at Boston on January 17 to discuss the action of the middle western players in quitting the United States golf association.

The announcement of the conference was accompanied by a brief statement characterizing the attitude of the west as "unsportsmanlike."
