BUILDING COUNCIL OPENS CONVENTION

Mayor P. H. McCarthy, President, Reads 58 Page Report; Treasurer's Statement

Waitress Pleads With Organization to Go on Record in Favor of Suffragettes

MONTEREY, Jan. 17.—Two hundred and fifty delegates to the state building trades council gathered in session here today. They were called to order by the president of the organization, Mayor P. H. McCarthy of San Francisco.

Mayor McCarthy read a 58 page report as head of the state council and reports were received from Secretary-Treasurer Timmos and General Counsel Cleve Dam. Seven new councils have been organized during the year and it was shown that the council is financially strong.

During the day Miss Maud Younger of the San Francisco waitresses' union made a plea at the convention to be put on record as favoring women's suffrage. In an address made to the convention this afternoon M. E. Light, president of the retail clerks' international association, appealed to the delegates to make purchases of clerks who were not in a position to display union cards upon demand.

OAKLAND Wants Next Session OAKLAND, Jan. 17.—An invitation to the state building trades council, now in session at Monterey, to hold its state convention next year in Oakland was extended by Mayor Frank K. Mott today. His invitation letter read: "On behalf of the citizens of Oakland I extend your organization a most cordial invitation to hold your next state meeting in Oakland. INJURED BY STREETCAR AFTER LEAVING CURT Former Alcatraz Postmaster Severely Hurt

The School Lunches—Instead of providing her children with a suitable lunch, some mothers give them a nickel or a dime and let them go to the bakery and choose for themselves. One doughnut is enough for the average stomach to take care of at one time. How long will it take to keep the habit of stuffing himself, day after day, with fried foods and sweet, dry cakes, before he will begin to wonder that he has a stomach? How long before he will be a confirmed dyspeptic, and who will be to blame? A little of these foods, occasionally, is permissible, for the average healthy child, but a great deal of the class of edibles day after day is one of the best methods known of ruining a child's digestive organs and undermining his general health.

The fun started with a big auto parade, which wound through Oakland's principal streets at 7:30 o'clock. It seemed almost inconceivable that there were so many motor-cars on the other side of the bay. The parade ended at the pavilion, where the formal opening took place.

cold water to head. Keep body warm. Apply hot water bottles to soles of feet. Give no stimulants. For hysteria. Apply mustard plasters to the soles of feet, wrists and palms of hands. Do not sympathize with or restrain patient. Frequently the patient recovers best if left entirely alone. For croup. Keep room warm and have water boiling close under pot that steam will reach the sufferer. Apply flannels wrung out of hot water to the throat and cover with waterproof material. Use mustard plaster on the soles of the feet and chest for a few minutes only. Apply hot foot baths, and if not relieved, use membranous croup, slack slime in the room, allowing patient to inhale. In sudden attacks sometimes playing with a toy or listening to a story will cause symptoms to disappear. A physician should be sent for immediately.

AGED MAN RESCUED BY HEROIC FIREMAN

Peter Hanrahan of Engine Company 25 Risks His Life at Mission Blaze

Overheated Range in Restaurant Causes Intense Excitement Among Residents

A fire accompanied by some thrilling incidents occurred about 1:30 o'clock yesterday morning in a restaurant at 2515 Mission street owned by J. C. Smith. An alarm was turned in and the firemen quickly responded. Peter Glynn, owner of the building, lived above the restaurant. He is an old man, and when the firemen reached the scene they were told that Glynn had not been seen. Fireman Peter Hanrahan of engine company 25 mounted a ladder and breaking a window in the upper flat with an ax made his way to the old man's bedroom, lifted him in his arms and brought him to safety through the smoke and flame.

The adjoining buildings at 2513 and 2517 were slightly damaged. A Corv of the Union floral company, who lives above his store, was awakened by the noise of the firemen, and seizing his baby called out to his wife to follow him. They made their way to the street and were followed by A. Banallie, candy store, 2519 Mission street, with his wife and three children.

The loss on the restaurant is estimated at about \$300 and to the adjoining buildings at about \$100. The fire was caused by an overheated range in the restaurant. Great excitement was caused in the neighborhood as the reflection from the flames into the sleeping rooms of hundreds of people created the impression that there was a disastrous fire raging, and the sidewalks were crowded with residents partially dressed.

COWARDLY THIEF TAKES OUT SPITE ON HORSE P. Ghiringhelli, driver for the Genoa bakery, 1351 Dupont street, saw two men steal six loaves of bread from his wagon at Green and Stockton streets yesterday morning, and struck one of them with a stick he had in his hand. A few minutes later while the driver was delivering bread at another house some one, believed to be the thief who had been struck, plunged a knife into the back near the shoulder of one of the horses in Ghiringhelli's team.
