

PAULHAN MAKES NEW RECORD IN AERIAL FLIGHT

Aviation Meet at Los Angeles Is Big Financial Success and Will Pay Dividend
Glenn H. Curtiss Will Not Be Able to Come to the San Francisco Meet

For a high flight over fields and woods and villages and hungry surf for more than 20 miles. Paulhan sailed at an altitude of from 500 to 1,000 feet over Redondo beach, Venice-by-the-Sea and other resorts toward Point Fermin. There were no floaters tied to the machine to save them from death in the ways should they fall. He made the trip and the other perilous flights of the afternoon with the ease of a run to your club in a taxicab.

Record by Wright
The passenger carrying record is held by Orville Wright, who today with Captain Engelhardt for 1 hour and 35 minutes at Berlin last fall, but Wright did not leave the course, where he could land at will.

Under Perfect Conditions
The flights were made under perfect atmospheric conditions. Earlier in the afternoon the wind had been "stuffy," and the other aviators had gone back to their tents after trying the course for a few laps.

Chasing Sea Gulls
The dirigible balloons entertained the crowd while waiting for Paulhan's appearance. Several times it was tried that he was coming, but it was found that it was only a bird. The Frenchman was chasing the sea gulls away from their nests.

Dummy Dynamite Bombs
Lieutenant Beck on his trip took dummy dynamite bombs to attempt to throw them from a height to a measured place on the ground. This was a test made for the benefit of the army. The result is that gumpits may have to be covered to protect them from aerial bombs in time of war.

Fails in Attempt
The other aviators did not accomplish much. Charles K. Hamilton made three starts of an attempt to lower Paulhan's altitude record of 4,165 feet. On his first trial Hamilton rose 152 feet on his second 100 feet and on his third approximately 700 feet. Paulhan on the seashore exceeded this without any effort at record breaking. Hamilton's machine was not working well enough to encourage him to go higher on the spiral pathway.

Curtiss Not Successful
Glenn H. Curtiss made two appearances. The first time he went round the course three times and the second time he tried for a speed record. His lap was 2:19, seven seconds from the record. Tomorrow is the last day of the meet.

Tour of the World
After the meet Paulhan, it was given out by his manager tonight, will go to San Francisco. He will make several flights there if the weather permits. From there he will start on a tour around the world.

Johnson Buys Machine
Willard will go in company with Colonel Frank Johnson of San Francisco, who has purchased a Curtiss biplane, and after exhibiting in the bay district he may continue as far north as Portland to demonstrate and to teach several new biplane owners how to aviate.

Aerial Line Planned
COLOGNE, Jan. 19.—Count Zeppelin, whose aerial flights in dirigible balloons have attracted world wide attention, is planning a monster airship capable of carrying 200 persons, and which it is proposed to use in a passenger service to be established between Hamburg and London. It was said today. A service will also be maintained from Hamburg to Cologne and Baden Baden.

Youth Builds Airship
ALAMEDA, Jan. 19.—Nelson W. Bagley, 16 years old, living at 1227 Pacific avenue, has constructed a biplane that he claims will fly. He has a working model of his air craft on exhibition in a local store. Bagley has devoted three years to the study of aerial navigation and airship building.
