

COMMITTEES PLANNED TO AD... BIG EXPOSITION

San Mateo County to Organize Permanent World's Fair Committee

Special Tax Levy to Provide for Building and Exhibits Is Proposed

To San Mateo county belongs the honor of being the first to take definite steps toward the organization of a permanent body to work in the county's interests in connection with the Panama-Pacific international exposition to be held in San Francisco in 1915.

Following action recently taken by the board of trade of San Mateo, and in line with resolutions adopted by the organization, a printed circular addressed to the commercial and civic organizations of San Mateo county has been issued and mailed to all parts of the county.

FAVOR SPECIAL TAX LEVY

In addition to the suggestion for a convention it is proposed that a petition should be circulated throughout the county asking the board of supervisors to levy a special tax, as provided by law, sufficient to provide \$2,000 a year for the next five years, and that the sum so raised be devoted to the erection of a county building at the city and the construction of an exhibit.

The circular contains a copy of the following resolution, adopted by the board of trade, in connection with the several suggestions.

Resolved, That this board of trade most heartily indorses the proposed Panama-Pacific international exposition, and hereby pledges its cordial support and co-operation in making it a success.

Resolved, further, that we invite all other public bodies in San Mateo county to unite with the San Mateo board of trade in a concerted plan of action, to secure suitable representation and exhibits at said exposition.

INDORSED BY CALIFORNIA CLUB

A copy of resolutions passed by the California club on January 18 was received yesterday at the exposition headquarters in a letter from Mrs. Edward L. Baldwin, president of the club, and Mrs. William H. Nichol, secretary.

The club went on record in favor of giving its cooperation toward securing funds for a woman's building for the exposition, to serve both for social and educational purposes, and also pledged itself to urge the various women's clubs of the state to assist in the project.

Resolutions of indorsement also were received yesterday from the Associated Grocery Brokers of San Francisco, Oscar Hoffman, secretary of the organization.

The current issue of the Jewish Times, of which Rabbi M. S. Levy is editor and Dawson Mayer managing editor, contains the exhibition motto, "San Francisco invites the world to the Panama-Pacific exposition in 1915," as a conspicuous front page heading.

MERCHANTS WILL ADVISE TO LEVY

San Joaquin Businessmen Adopt Measures for Exploitation of Their District

SACRAMENTO, Jan. 22.—A deal involving the purchase of 20,000 acres of land southeast of this city and in the Sheldon district has been undertaken by two large colonization companies. The property is to be sold in small farms of from 10 to 100 acres.

As part of the scheme the Colonial Land and Colonization and the Pioneer Improvement company have taken up 6,662 acres about five miles below this city. Colonists will be brought from the Dakotas, Missouri and Pennsylvania. A. J. G. W. Kiesel and G. W. Peltier are behind the deal.

MINING PROMOTER IS FREED OF FRAUD CHARGE

Iowa Jury Refuses to Indict for Misrepresentation

SACRAMENTO, Jan. 22.—M. M. McIntyre, erstwhile newspaperman and mining promoter, who was taken back to Council Bluffs, Ia., to answer to a charge of selling mining stock under false representations, returned to Sacramento today, having been discharged from custody. The Iowa grand jury refused to indict him. McIntyre says he will now take steps to regain possession of the Nevada county mine over which the trouble arose and will sue his prosecutors for false imprisonment.

ELECTRIC LINE WILL COST SEVEN MILLION

Estimated Cost of Constructing Eureka Line Announced

EUREKA, Jan. 22.—The proposed electric railway to connect Eureka with Red Bluff, Redding or some other point in the Sacramento valley will cost \$7,000,000, according to estimates of the engineers who have completed the survey. The committee, which is gathering statistics regarding the towns along the proposed line, has not yet reported and the eastern terminus has not been selected.

WIFE BELIEVES THAT HUSBAND WAS MURDERED

Coroner's Jury Says That Peter Bartle Committed Suicide

MARYSVILLE, Jan. 22.—Although the coroner's jury decided that Peter Bartle of Linda township committed suicide, Mrs. Bartle believes he was murdered by a neighbor with whom he quarreled. Coroner Kelly has begun a separate investigation to ascertain if there is anything in this theory.

AGED MAN IS FOUND DEAD IN HIS HOME

STOCKTON, Jan. 22.—Antonio Leoni, aged 75 years, was found dead in bed at his home, a short distance east of town today. The discovery was made by James Mancuso, a neighbor. Louis Roselle, a friend, called on the old man yesterday. He found him lying on the floor in a stupor and placed him in bed. It is presumed that death was due to old age.

LABORER DIES AS A RESULT OF INJURIES

STOCKTON, Jan. 22.—Hans Hansen, a Dane, died last night from injuries received yesterday while working on a dredger at Clifton court. He fell from a boom to the deck, a distance of 30 feet, and broke both arms, one of his legs and fractured his skull. The dead man has a brother in Oakland.

ACCIDENTAL DEATH—Denver, Jan. 22.—Mistaking a bottle of strychnine for one containing bromo-seltzer, Mrs. Kate Jones last night took a dose of the poison to kill a dozen persons and died before a physician could be summoned.

Are Charged With Neglecting to Pay License Tax

OAKLAND, Jan. 22.—Members of 11 undertaking firms were arrested today on misdemeanor charges of neglecting to pay license fees to the city of \$5 each quarter. The undertakers are opposed to the taxation, which they claim is a discrimination against their business, and have announced that they will fight.

Warrants for the undertakers' arrests were sworn out this morning by W. A. J. Franke, license inspector. The warrants were turned over to Captain of Police Lynch, who notified the undertakers that they were wanted and that bail in each case was \$25. One by one the embalmers walked to the police station, left their money and were told to appear in the police court tomorrow morning.

per cent on their bonds. The banks set that money from the city for 2 per cent and loan to the taxpayers at 5, 6 or 7 per cent net.

"There is no good business for the taxpayer. I see they are talking about the \$4,000,000 now on hand earning \$80,000 a year. So it will, and it will cost the taxpayers just \$100,000 in interest on their bonds to get that \$80,000. Reduced to its simplest statement, the taxpayers lose an even \$100,000."
