WOLGAST KNOCKED OUT IN THE 42D ROUND BY CARL GARDNER
Monte Loses Bantam Weight Title to Frank Conley, Taking Terrific Punishment

JEFFRIES' ARENA, LOS ANGELES, Feb. 22.—Frank Conley of Kenosha, Wis., knocked out Monte Atell of San Francisco in the forty-second round of a fight that was scheduled for 45 rounds, this afternoon. Conley emerged from the fierce encounter without a scratch, while Atell lay on the floor for two minutes after receiving Conley's finishing blow on the jaw, his left eye entirely closed and badly discolored, his mouth and nose bleeding and his lips swollen and bruised. His seconds did not wait for the referee to count him out, but threw up the sponge as the fight began to straighten his limbs and rolled on his back five seconds after he had fallen. Conley danced to his corner, confident that Atell could not get up and that he had won the bantam weight championship and the McCarey diamond belt that goes with it. Atell fought gamely up to the end of the thirty-second round. It was given and taken with Atell having, perhaps, a shade more of the fight than Conley. All the time Conley had been cutting distressing jabs with left and following up with right swings on Atell's face. Atell never seemed to be able to break through Conley's defense. When they mixed it he was always the aggressor, but he nearly always got the worst of the exchange. Atell perceptibly weakened in the thirty-third round when Conley landed a terrific drive with his right, hitting the heart and he was going down hill from that point on to the finish. In the thirty-seventh Conley fought him to the ropes and in the mixup Atell turned his back to Conley and started to run. Conley was on him like a flash and the gong saved Atell from a knockout at this juncture. Again in the thirty-eighth Conley knocked Atell nearly through the ropes with his right and left hands. Atell started the forty-second round with his usual rush, but slipped and fell on all fours. Conley waited for him to rise and then staggered him with a series of cuts and punches. Conley saw the end coming and cheered Conley wildly as he rushed Atell about the ring. As he came away from a clinch Atell was dazed by jabs to his face and turned his back to Conley and started to run. Tomlin, defeated W. B. Cragin Jr., champion, 6-2, 9-7. The best matches of the doubles were those in which B. M. Phillips and E. F. Lee defeated the Philadelphia pair, A. T. Hoskins and E. M. Sheppard, 6-1, 6-2, and to get into the second bracketed, Ed. Wolgast hooks a right to jaw, Nelson is almost out, but will not quit.
