Hair Line Finishes and Fast Time Mark Field Day at Stadium

BITTERLY cold wind was the means of assisting the sprinters in making fast time at the Olympic club's field day at the stadium yesterday afternoon.

In the novice hundred five heats were rapidly run off, good time being made, all the participants being from the University of California.

There were 34 starters in the quarter mile, which was won by the California veteran, Dozier, in the last few yards, Newsom of California and Joy of the Olympic club tying for second.

The 100 yard event brought out fine competition. Woods, the little Berkeley high school runner, wearing the colors of the Barbarian athletic club, flashed in first, with Rod Hollis almost abreast of him.

The two mile team race brought out six teams, California No. 1 winning by a narrow margin from the Olympic club.

T. L. Coleman Makes 220 Yard Dash in :22 1-5, Establishing New Stanford Record

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Feb. 26.—T. L. Coleman '12 the speedy Stanford sprinter, demonstrated his ability as a runner again this morning, when he broke the tape in 22 1-5 seconds in the 220 yard dash, establishing a new Stanford record for this event, which before stood at 22 2-5 seconds.
